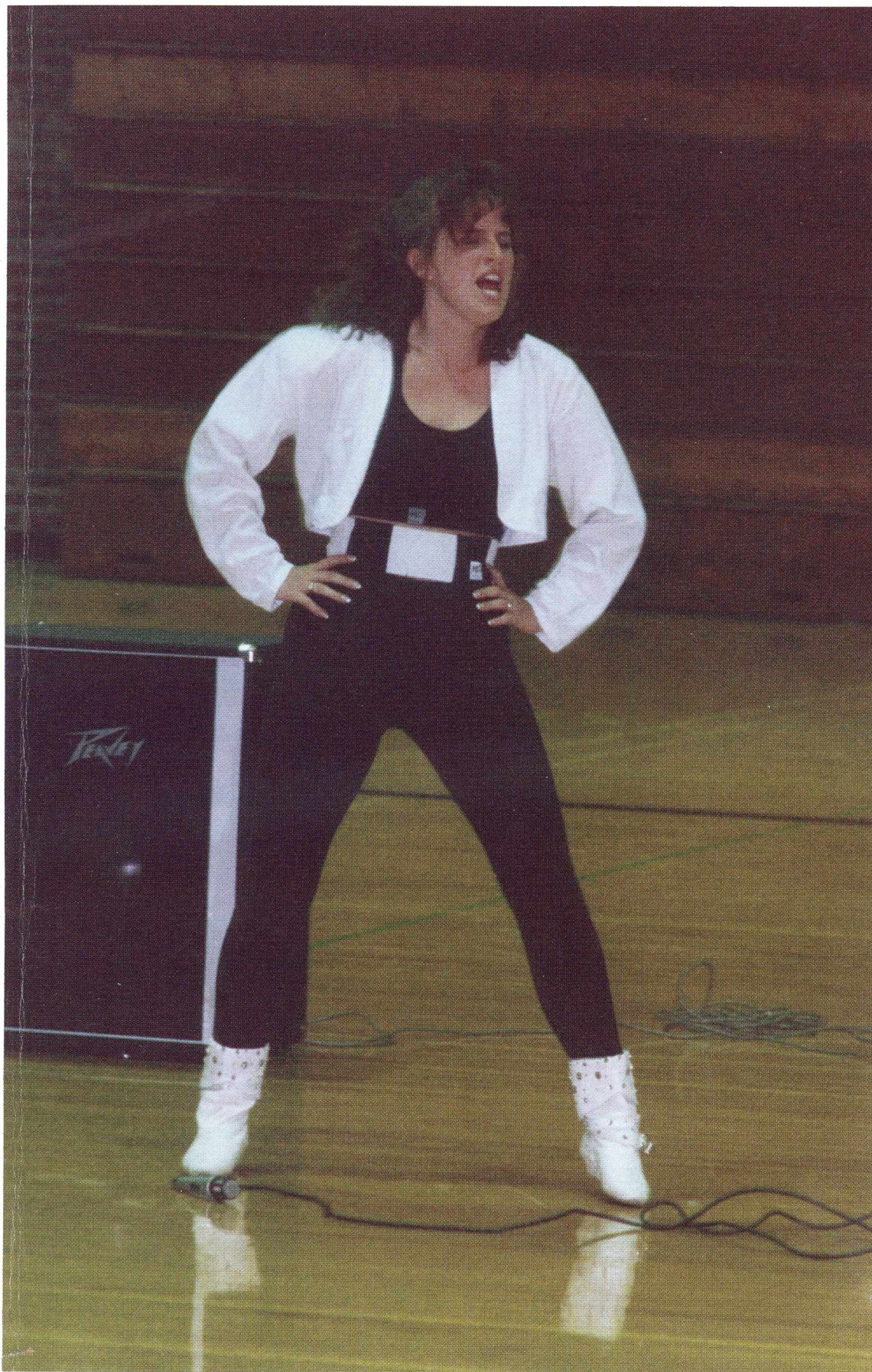

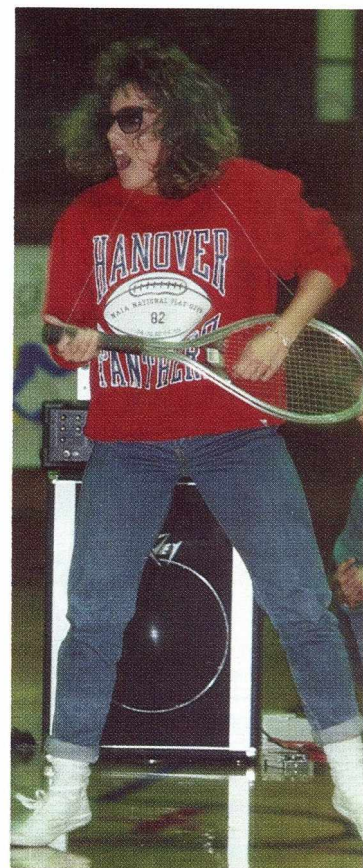

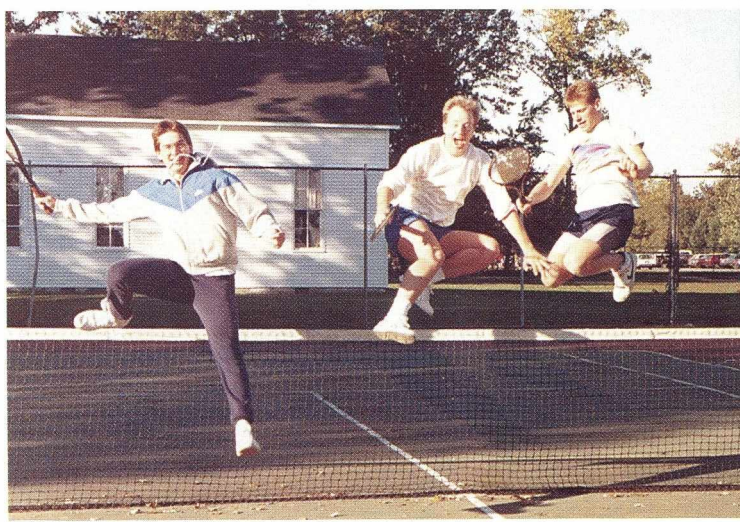

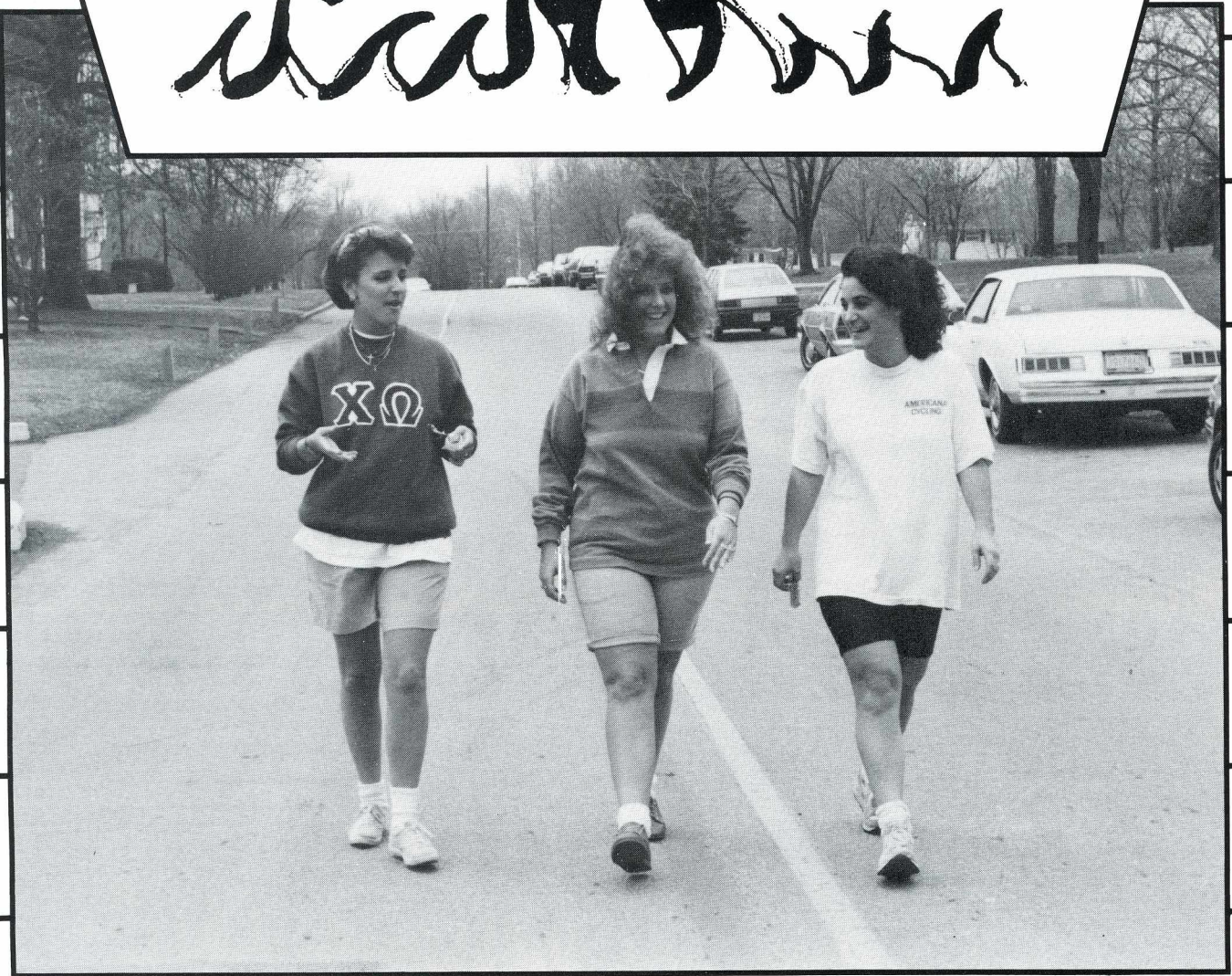
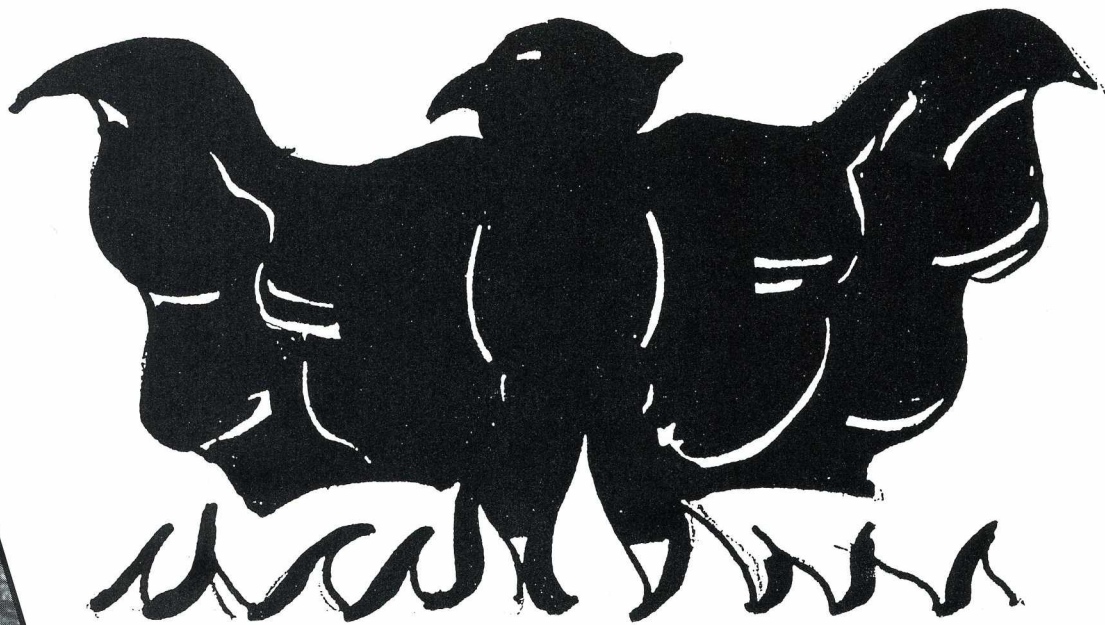

Homecoming events, during the week of October 4-8 started off with the comedian Henry Cho performing at Parker Auditorium on Tuesday, October 4. On Wednesday, the bed and trike races were held. Teams from every residence hall and Greek house lined up on the street in front of Donner Hall to compete. Teams for the bed races, each consisting of five men, raced from the Campus Center to the Administration Building and back. The women rode or pushed tricycles up and down the street twice in the trike races. That night at Parker Auditorium, students serenaded the king or queen candidate representing their residence hall or Greek house. The candidates, each with an escort, sauntered down one of the staircases, teeth chattering as they smiled at their peers.

lied at a pep session behind the Sig house around a blazing bonfire.

Volleyball teams competed for the finals Friday afternoon and the Homecoming dance was held in the cafeteria at night. The dance was from 9p.m. until 1a.m. with the crowning of the king and queen at 10:00. Kym Smith from the Thetas was pronounced queen and Adam Sanders from the Lambdas was pronounced king. Sanders said, "I was surprised and very excited when they announced the king. It is an honor to be so well recognized by my peers." The Rave provided entertainment for the evening singing songs from the 1960's to the 1980's.

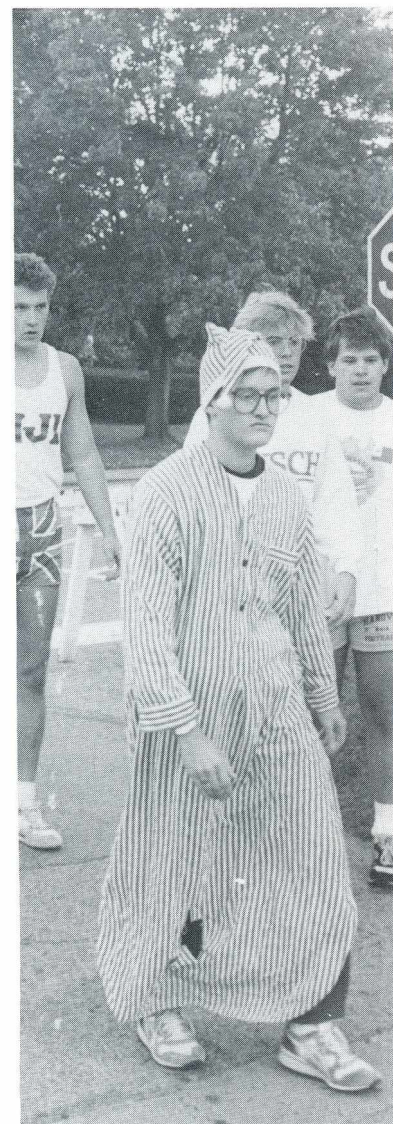

Before the week's events occurred though, the theme "Malibu Homecoming" was chosen. "The theme set a

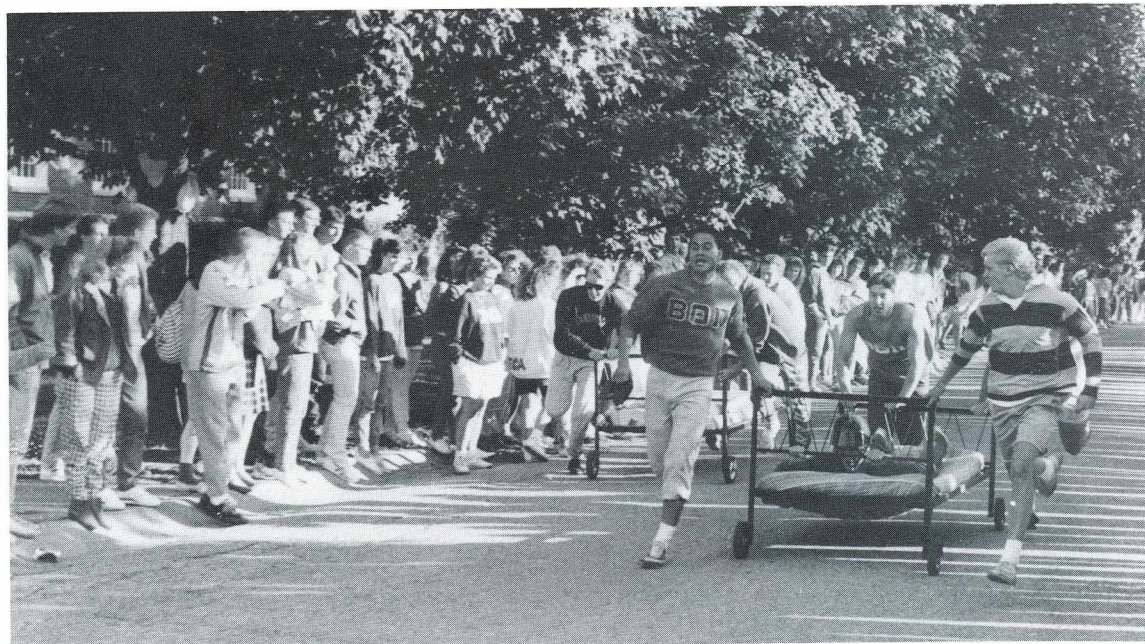
precedent for a great Homecoming. It was something everyone could relate to. It was a fun theme!" said Lucy Shaffer, senior and SPB president.

New Phone System Finally Comes

Alexander Graham Bell invented the telephone a long time ago. I learned this in grade school, so I know this is true. Like indoor toilets, it is one of those things that people take for granted today. But the significance of the new phone system that was installed on Hanover's campus last year may not fully be appreciated by everyone — at least not to the degree that it should.

When President Russell Nichols took the helm of Hanover College, one of the first things he promised to the student body at the senior convocation was a new phone system. The reasons seemed obvious to the students at the time. But for the benefit of the newer students reading this yearbook, some explanation is in order.

Before the new system, there was a limited number of phone lines that were available. Thus, each dorm floor was entitled to only two phones, one on the end of each hall (for the women in Ide and Blythe, there was only one phone per floor). Often, at least one of these few phones was out of order.

This being the case, it was almost impossible for anyone to reach anyone else by phone on campus. For instance, the men of Crowe Hall never (I really mean never) answered the phone. Usually, the guys just assumed that it

wasn't for them, which was probably true, considering the number of men on each floor. If you wanted to get in touch with someone there, it was quicker to simply walk.

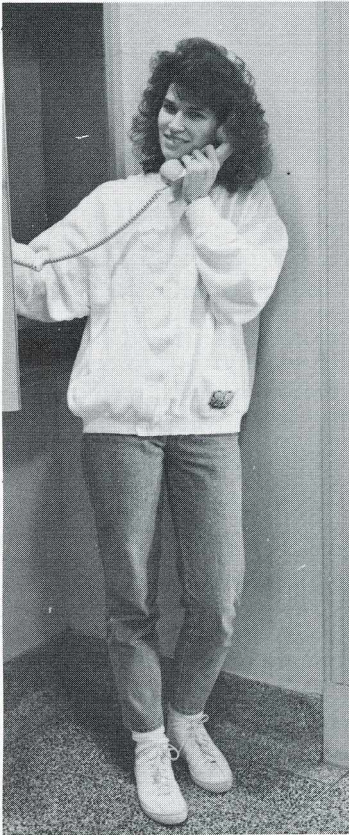
If any call came from off campus, the phones would ring twice. This was important, because the "double ringer" was the only way to get someone to answer the phone (in Crowe, for instance). Unfortunately, students caught on to the idea of calling from an outside line in order to get the double ring effect, so sometimes folks didn't even answer those.

If anyone ever wanted to call somewhere off campus (in the community), an outside line had to be obtained. This trick was easier said than done. The busy lines were cited in President Nichols speech as a primary reason for his decision.

In addition, students could not call long-distance from their hall phones. They had to use the pay phones that were provided in each dorm. Every dorm had one, except Donner which had two (a sexist decision, many people thought, because it presumed that the freshman women needed to call home more often). Lines were long, needless to say. If you really had to make a call, you could walk to the Campus Center, which had the luxury of two pay phones.

Some people miss the old days when phones were scarce. If the person you wanted was gone, you could at least leave a message with someone on the same hall. Also, everyone on your hall got to share in your social life ("Stacey, the phone's for you . . . and its a boy!"). But, mostly, everyone breathed a collective sigh of relief when they heard about the new system.

They say change comes slow at Hanover. So rejoice in your new phone system. Who knows, maybe this is a sign that other great innovations of the twentieth century (street lights and sidewalks come to mind) are coming to Hanover.

Finally, the event is "for the freshmen, by the freshmen," commented Ann. Happy with the outcome, hall government hopes that it will become an even greater success year after year.

lights, bathing the frozen ground with its radiance. Choral groups rent the air with carols.

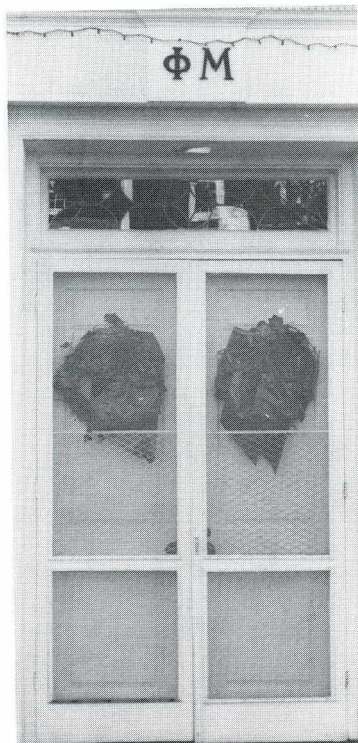
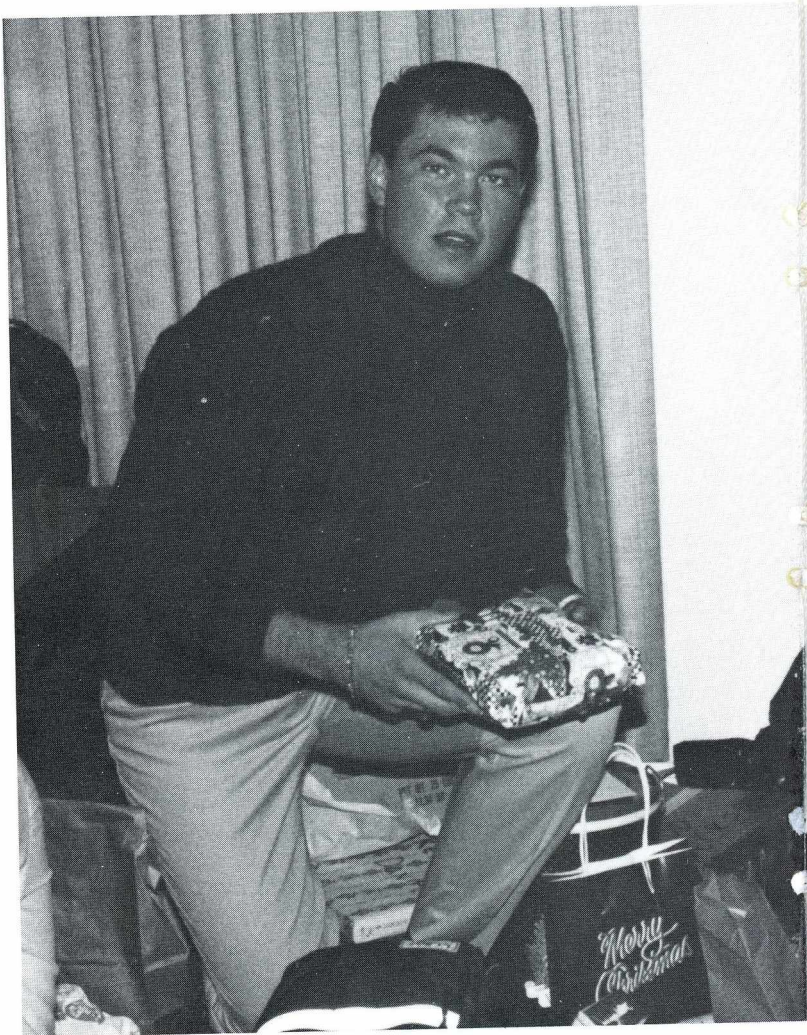

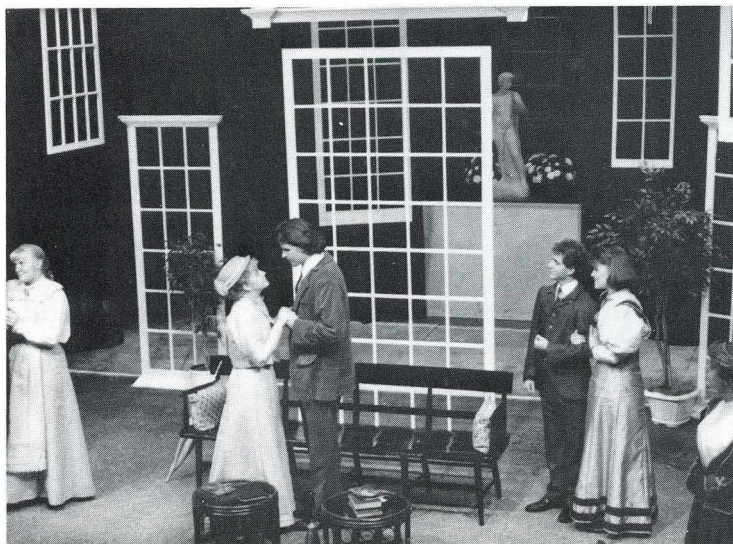

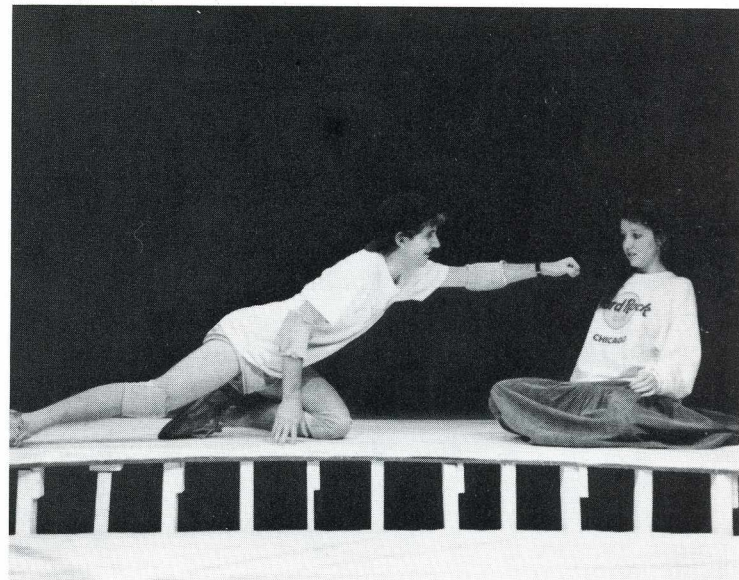
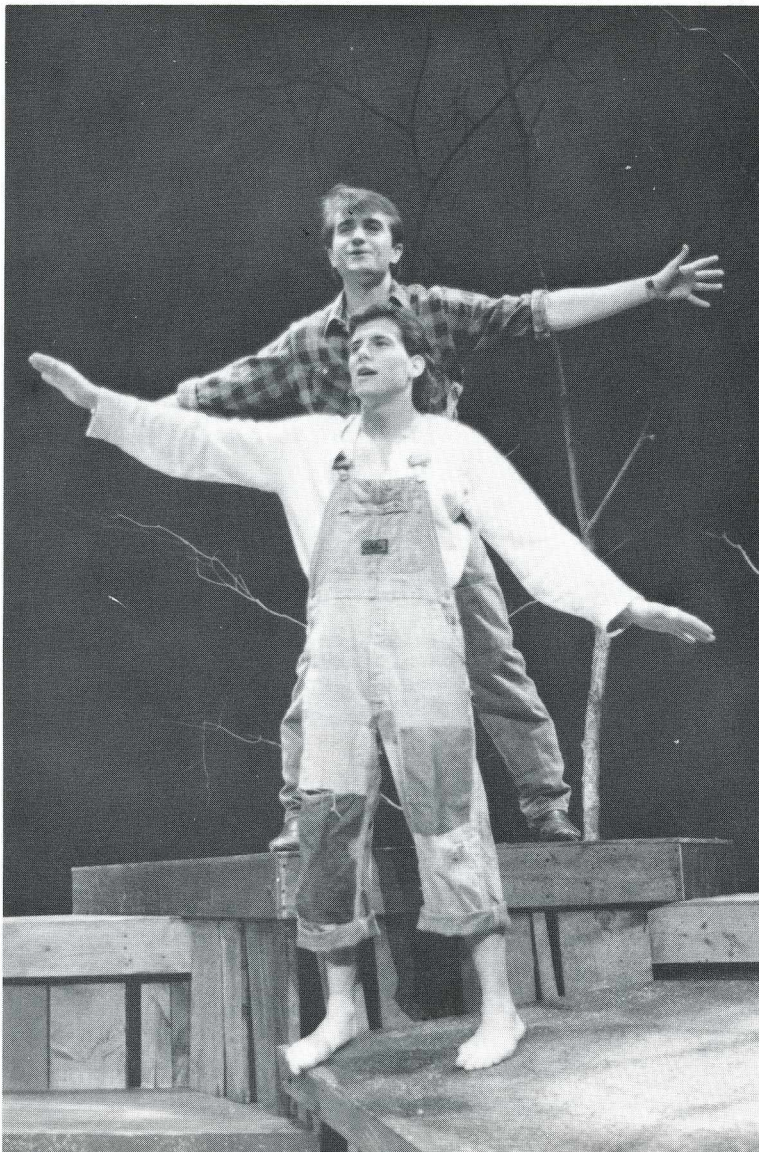

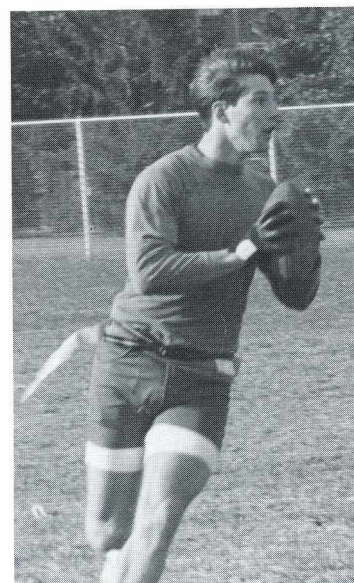

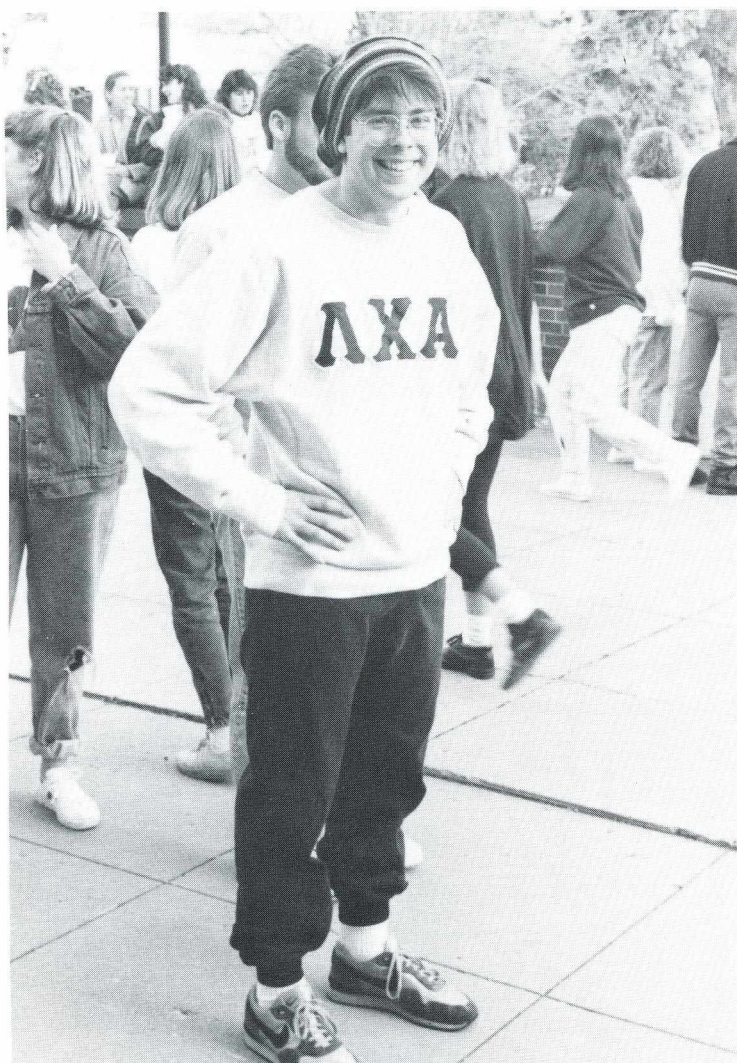

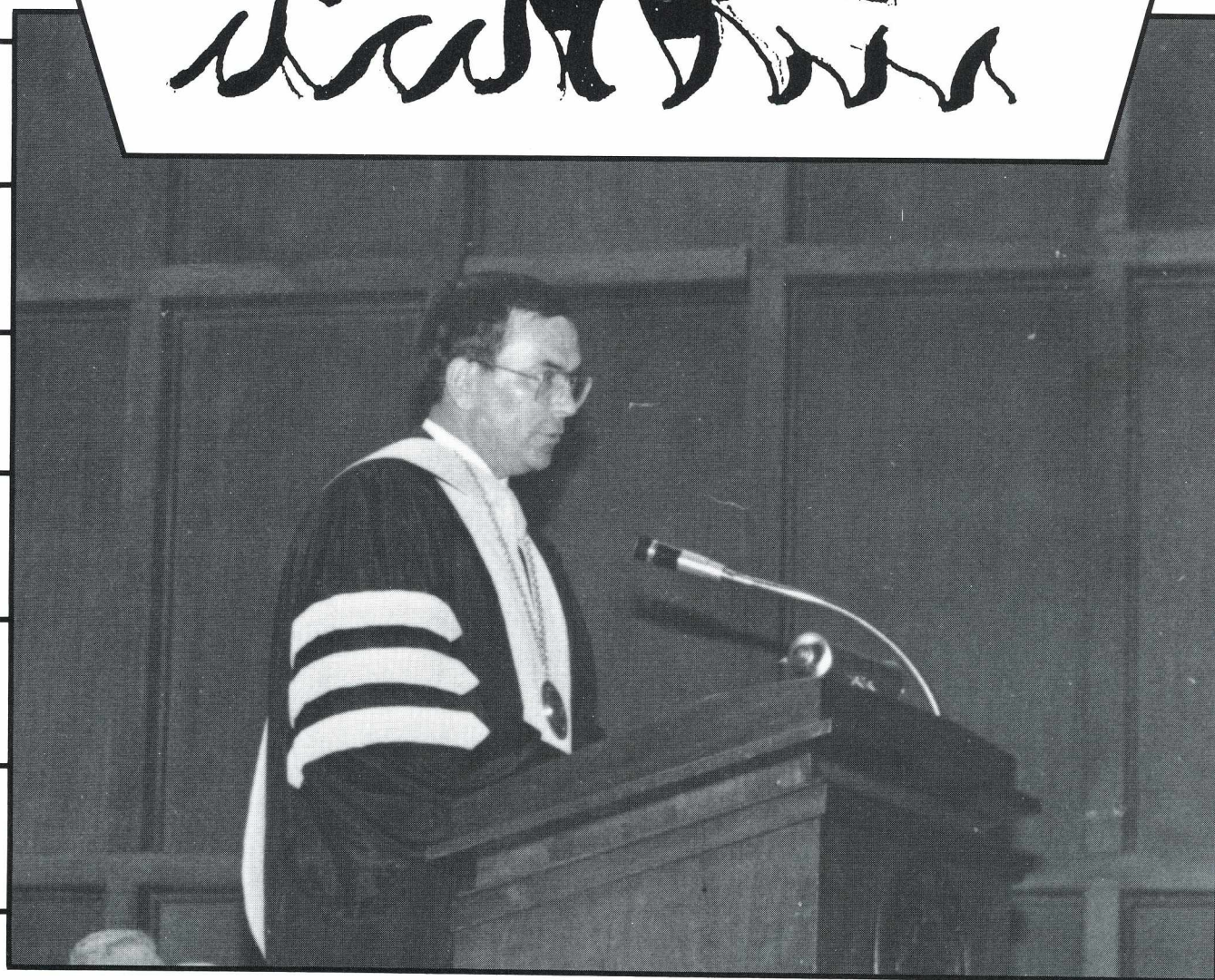
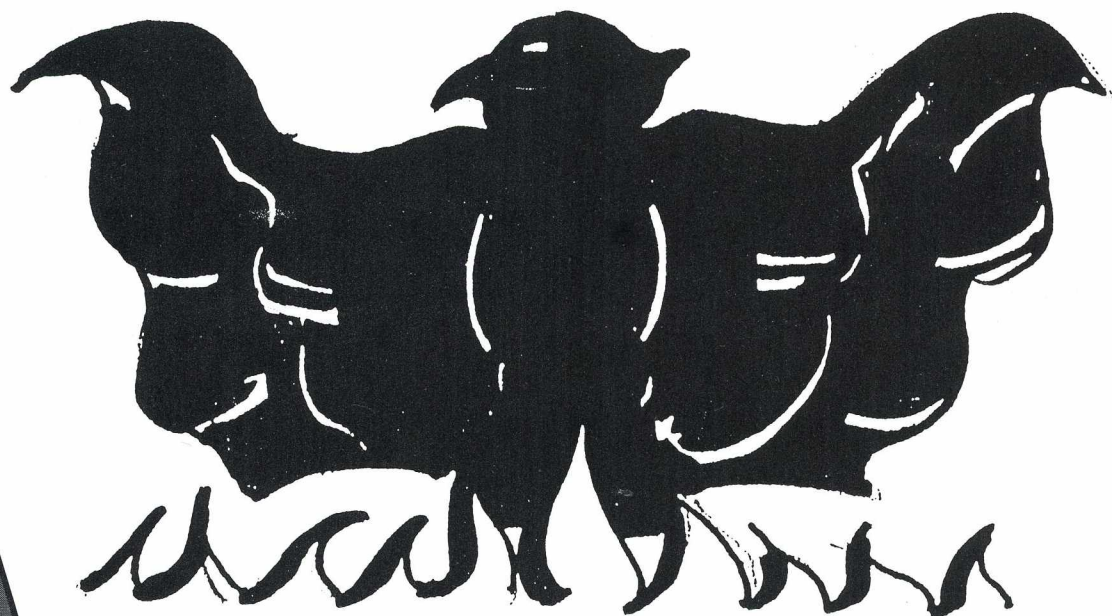

Administration Aims High

At the annual President's Convocation this year, second-term president Russell J. Nichols spoke of the pride that envelopes Hanover, academically and otherwise.

A sense of community that gives warmth and openness to members of our campus is what Nichols claimed makes Hanover different from most other campuses. In fact, he believes that this feeling, along with Hanover's academic challenge, brings the high number of applicants to the school each year.

The number of valedictorians in the 1988-89 freshman class was twice as many as last year and SAT scores of applicants are the highest ever, thus allowing the administration to be so selective in choosing who comes to this commu-

nity.

Of course, one important reason for Hanover's high academic standing is its excellent staff of educators. As Nichols stated, "Everyone has at least one professor who they silently thank for making a difference during their academic experience."

Nichols stressed the importance of learning to analyze new situations. "I hope that at Hanover you have come to appreciate some of the subjects you studied because you had to, only to find that there was more to learn and to enjoy than you expected. I hope in the process you have learned self-discipline and are able to make concentrated commitments, which will allow you to succeed where lesser folks will give in."

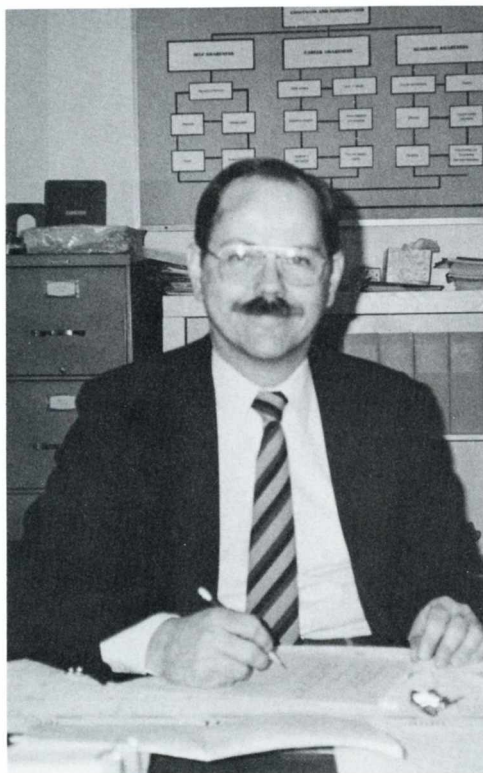

Collier Wins Big

In late November when John R. Collier, Athletic Director and retired basketball coach, found out that he had been elected to the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics Hall of Fame, he was quite surprised.

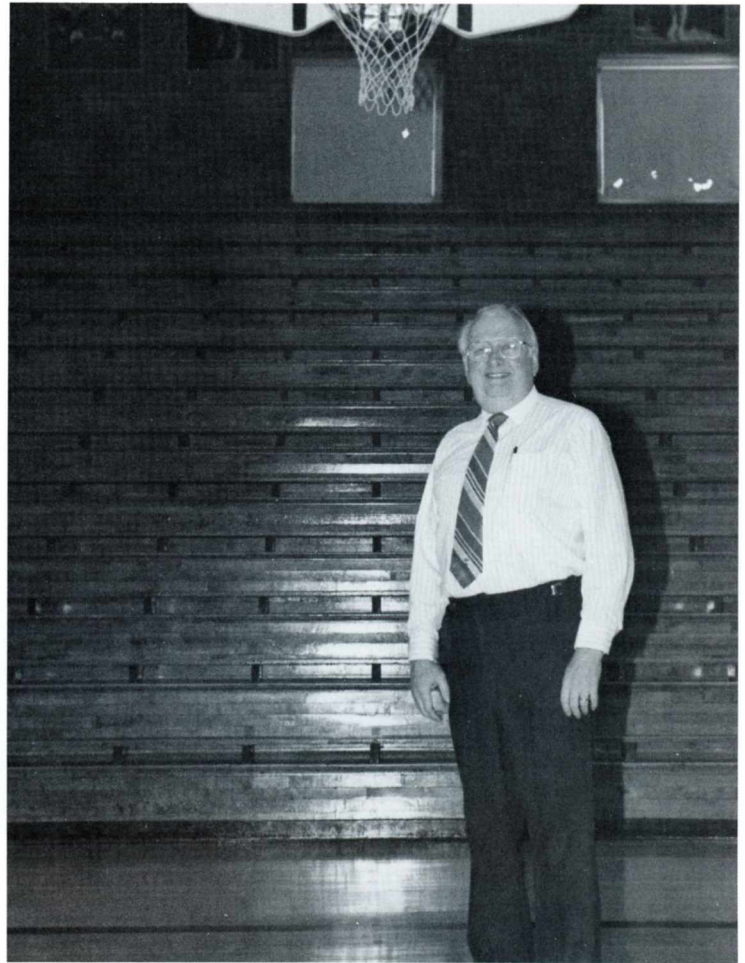
Collier, a 1951 HC graduate, coached our Panthers for 22 seasons before retiring last year. His compiled record during that time was 388-242 with a win percentage of 61.6 games. Collier's teams competed in the NAIA national tournament seven times and advanced to the second round twice.

Collier, himself, has been selected Hoosier-Buckeye Colle-

giate Conference Coach of the Year six times and NAIA District 21 Coach of the Year. In the 1974, he was named NAIA National Coach of the Year. Collier was duly elected to the Indiana Basketball Hall of Fame in 1979.

On January 21, Collier was honored by the school and several of his former players during half-time of the final regular season game. At that time, he stated, "... I have said many times, in all the years I coached here, I never once scored a point. I owe my success to ... all the players who played here over the years."

POLITICAL SCIENCE & INTERNATIONAL STUDIES



Metz begins new class while Courville begins anew.

In early 1989, Dr. J. Carl Metz received a \$5000 stipend from Lily Endowment, Inc. This money will be used to organize a new class to add to those already offered by HC's Political Science Department. The money will compensate for time spent in research and preparation by Metz for the class.

The Metz course will be offered for the first time during the Winter Term of 1990 and will then become a permanent class here at HC.

The course is called "American Campaign Management." It will revolve around the trends in American Politics toward professional campaign management.

HANOVER FOOTBALL TESTS PANTHER PRIDE

Having to cope with the loss of senior quarterback Bob Burhardt to graduation, along with a number of other key players, was not an easy task for this year's Panther football team. Suffering their first losing season since 1972, the Panthers nonetheless were usually able to keep pace with often physically larger opponents.

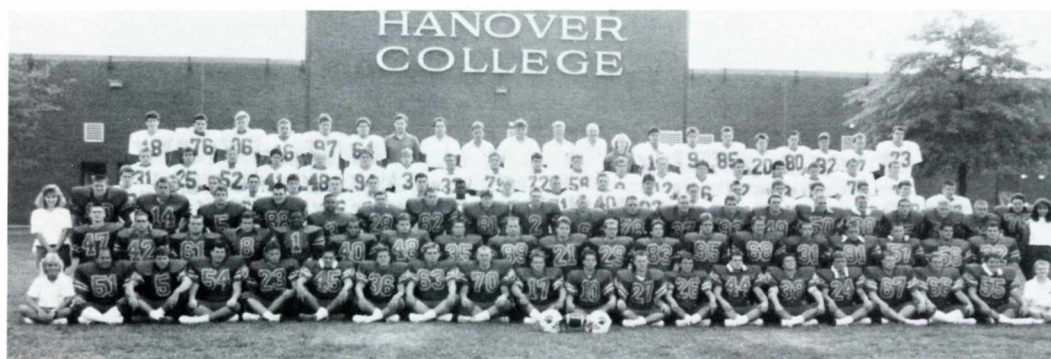
Leading the gridiron efforts for 1988 were the team captains Mike Luker, Gary Greene, Steve Hart, and Mark Dorn. Despite their leadership, the Panthers took an early loss in their opener against Rose Hulman, 33-27. The team managed to bounce back with a win over Earlham, 48-23. Unfortunately, the Panthers were not able to keep their momentum going, losing to a much larger nationally-ranked Georgetown team 41-13. Encouragingly, Hanover followed that loss up with back-to-back victories against Campbellsville and Defiance. There was a loss to Anderson in a close one 56-42. Hanover then went on their longest road trip to face Manchester, winning big 31-13. That was to be Hanover's last victory. They lost tough ones to Bluffton, Franklin, and Taylor. This was Hanover's first losing season since 1972.

That still did not take away the excellent senior year for the four captains. Mike Luker was all District 21 (MVP District). He made first team all American two consecutive years, leading the nation in receptions, reception yardage, touchdowns, and receiving. Mike broke eight records, a two year academic all American, and Kodak all American. Quarterback Gary Greene was H-M all District 21, he was third leading passer in the nation (27 TD's and a 62% completion percentage). LB/P Mark Dorn was all District for two years. Lastly, FS Steve Hart was an all District 21 selection, also named best DB in the district. Dave McDowell was also all District for his second consecutive year.

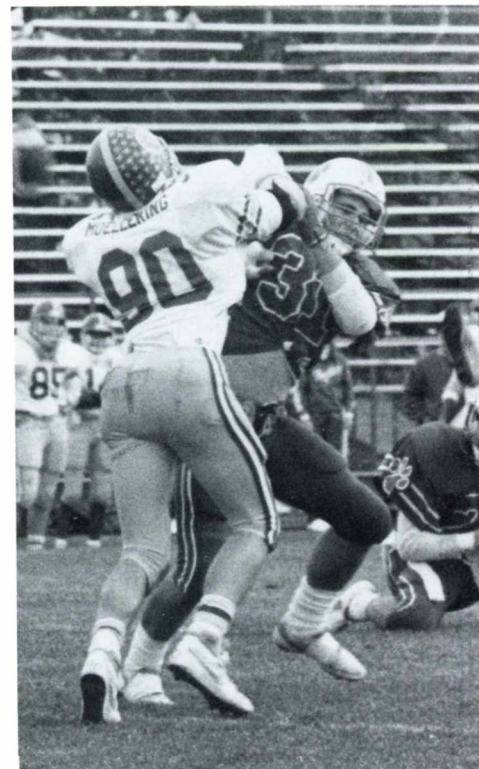
Making the Honorable Mention all District 21 were Curt Ayers(WB), Mike Bell(OL), Bryan Murphy(RB), Charlie Pinkerton(WB), and Tim Salatin(DE).

Even though the Hanover College Panthers ended up (4-6), the team ranked 6th in the nation (NAIA) in total offense averaging 442, 40 yards per game. The team passing offense ranked 3rd at 319, 40 yards per game.

With the weight room improvements and tougher off season preparation, Hanover can start a new string of winning seasons.

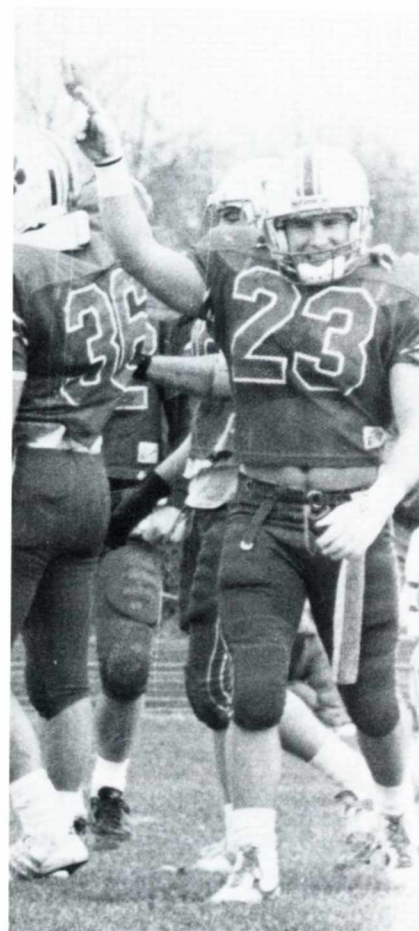

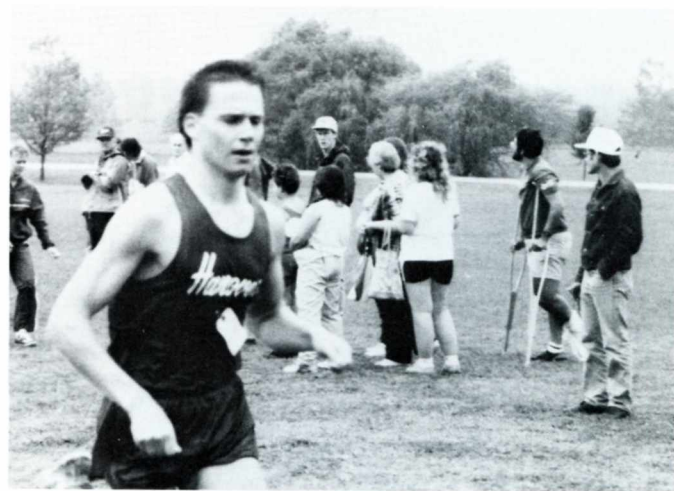

Cross Country Shines

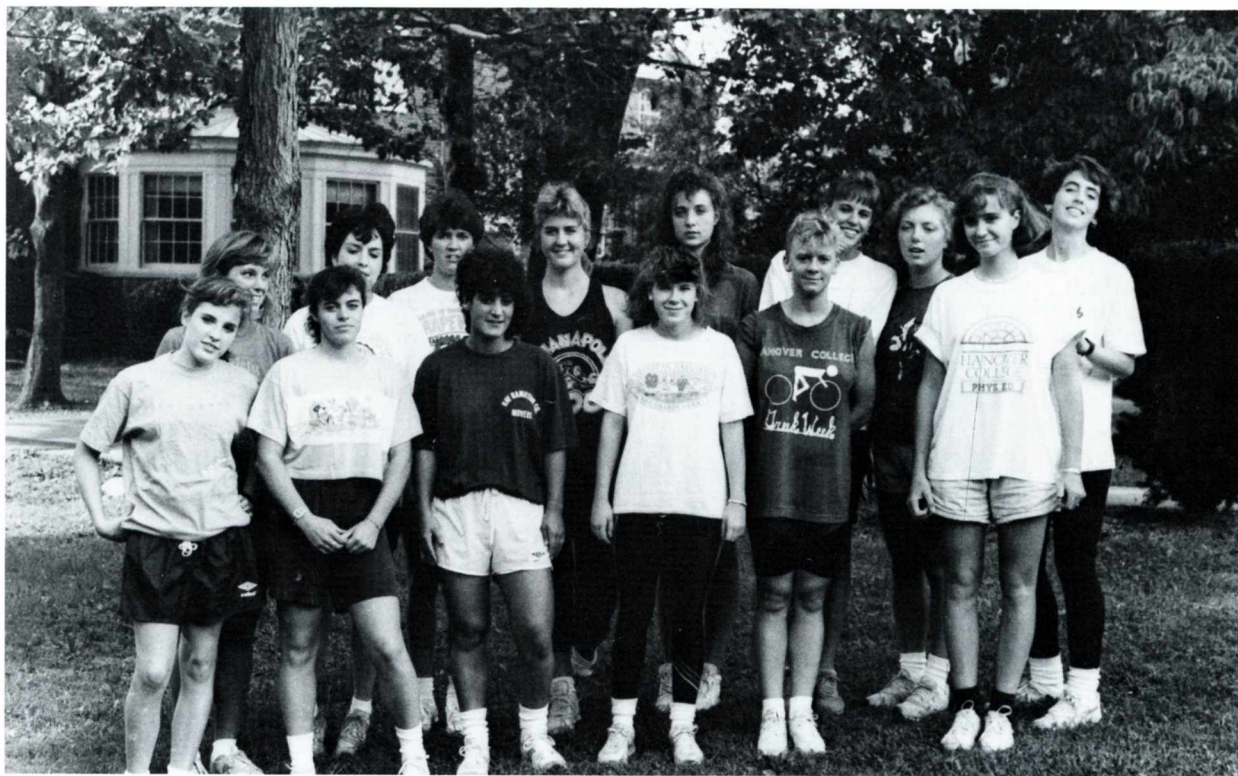

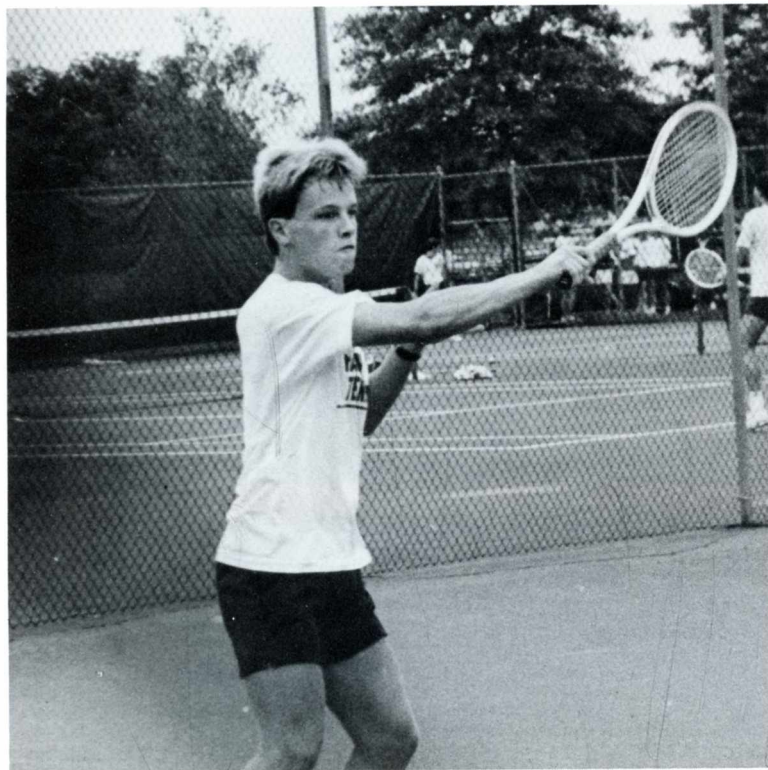

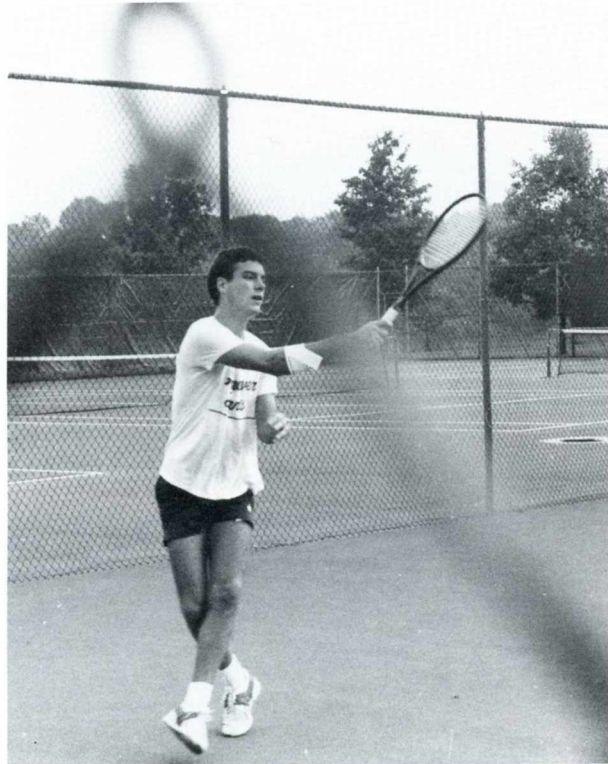
Netmen Go To Nationals

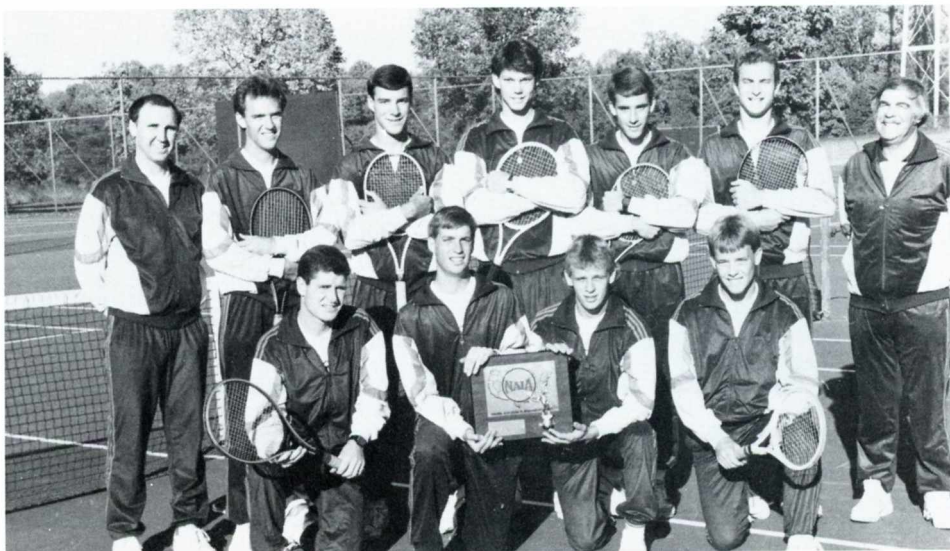


Above: Freshman Jon Faris hits a baseline shot during one of his number six singles matches.

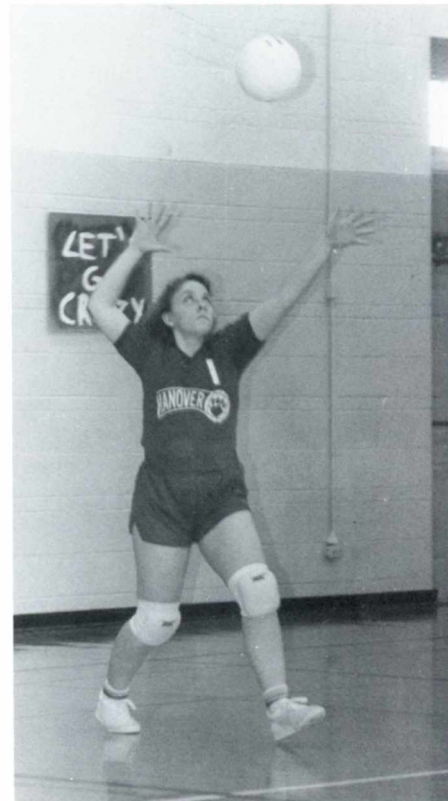

Hanover Track: On The Run



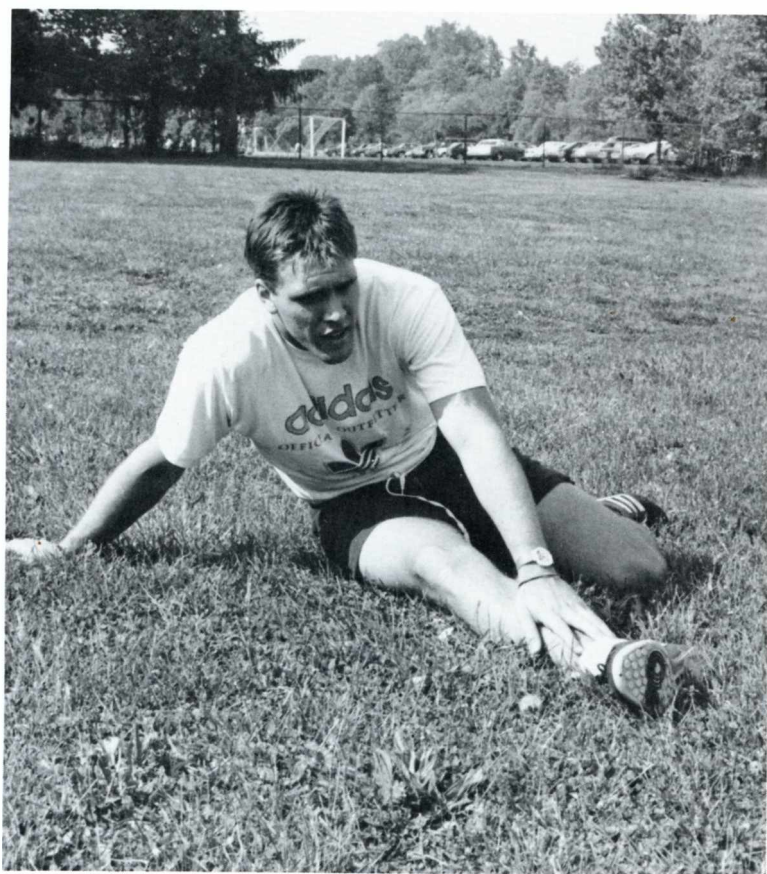
The Hanover track team has never been known for its ability to set conference records or to dominate the regular season. But they have been known for their sportsmanship, and the 1989 season was no exception.

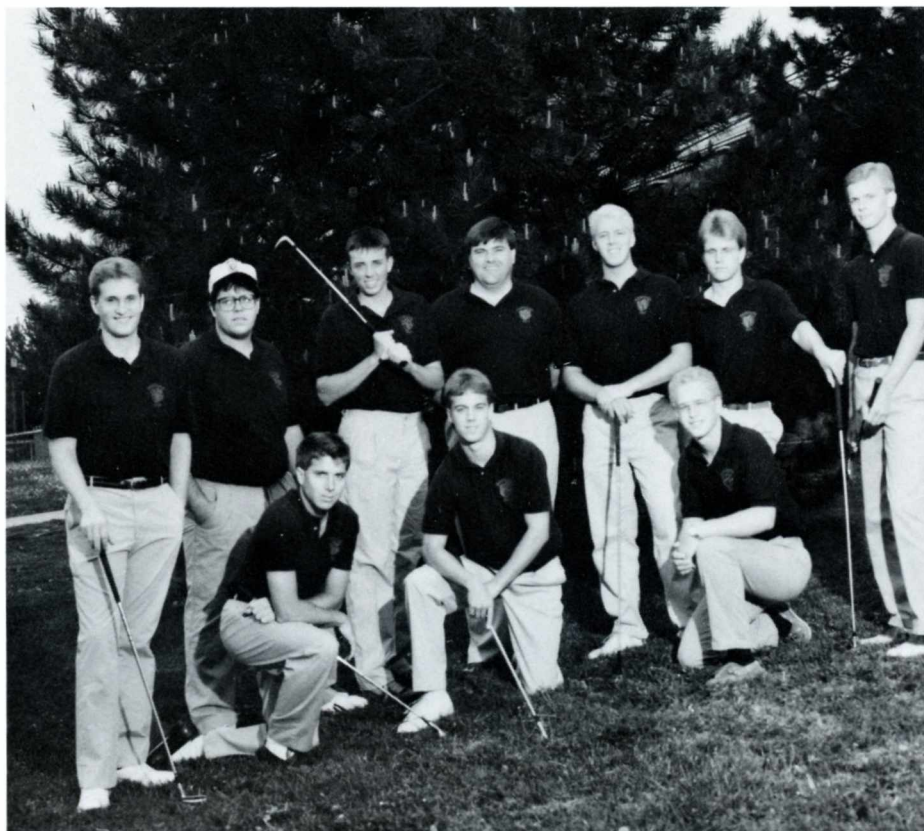

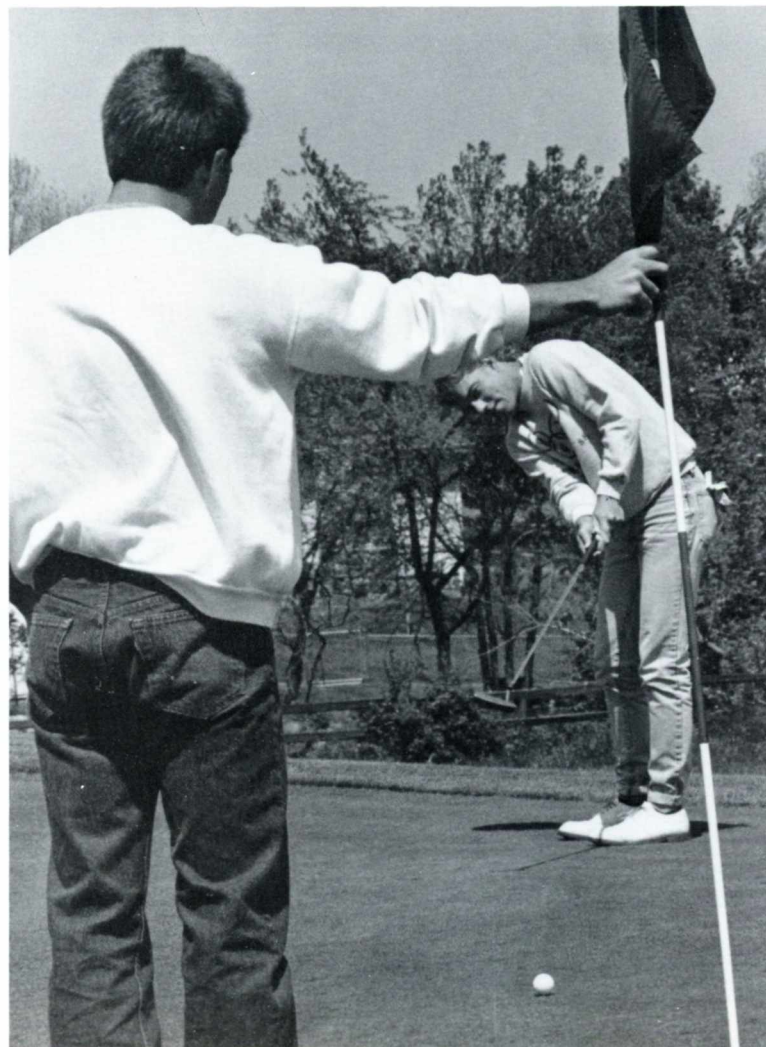
Golf Team

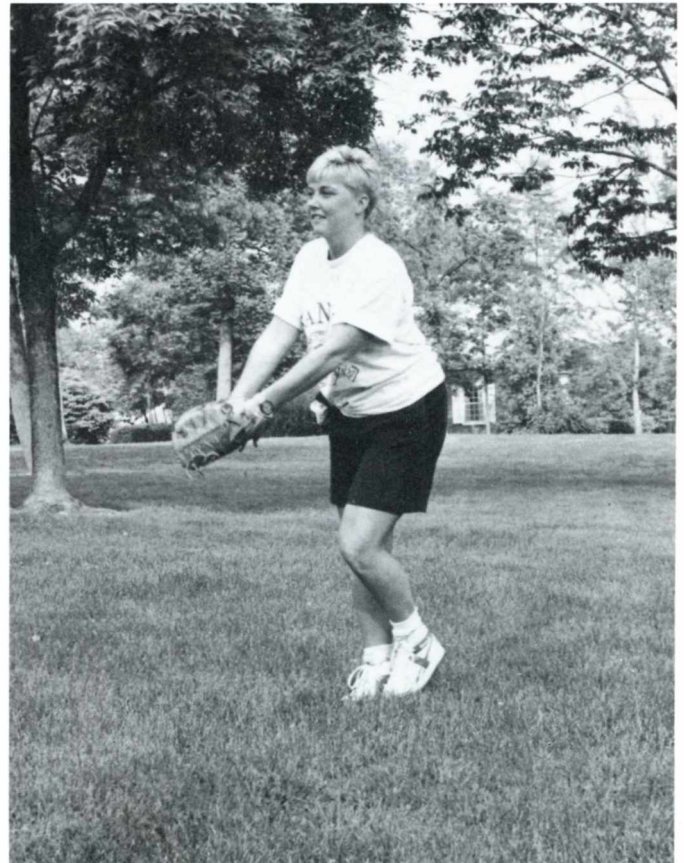

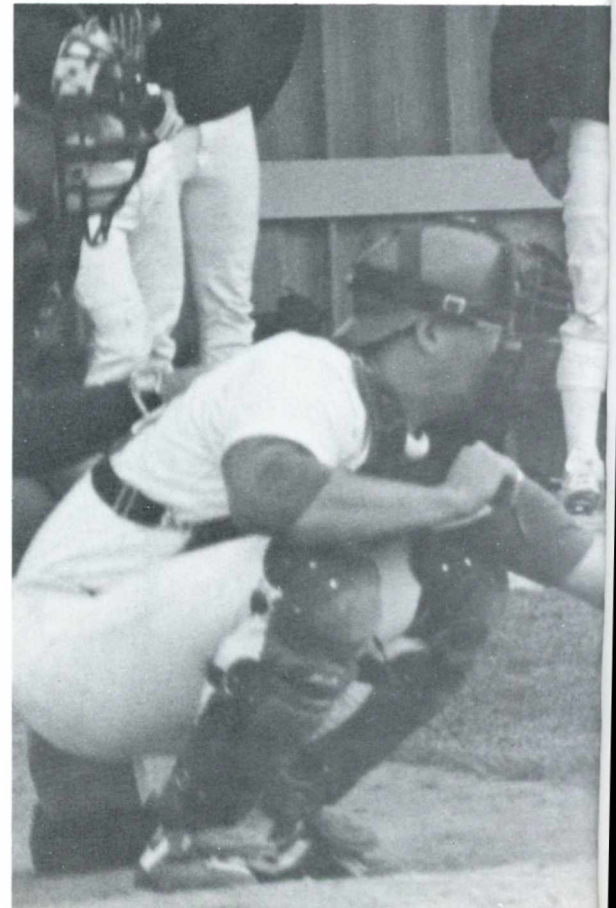
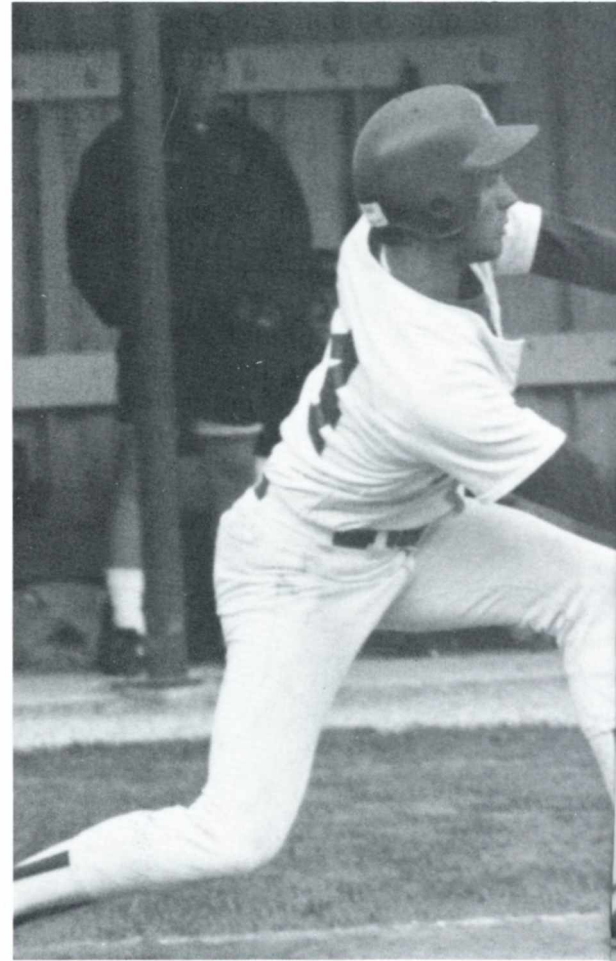
Season Shines

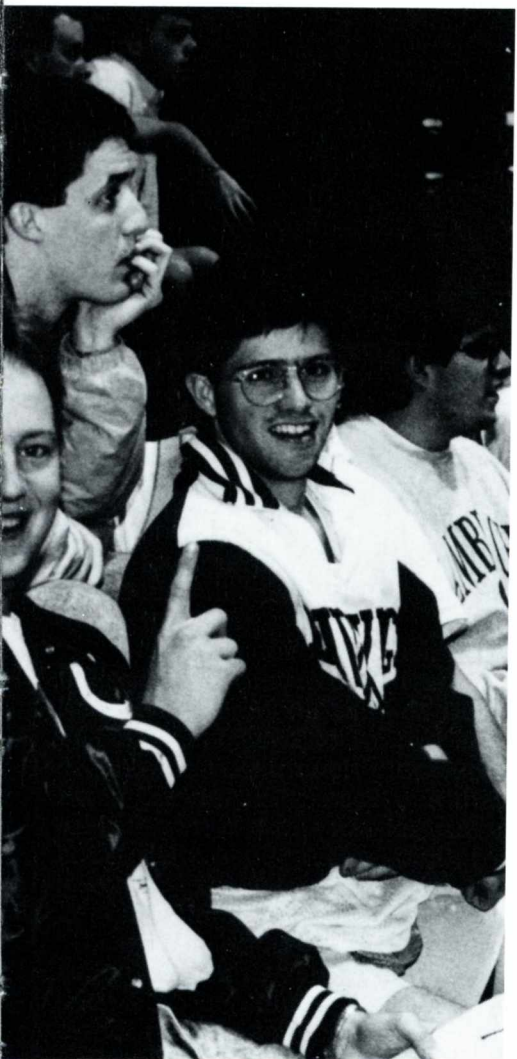

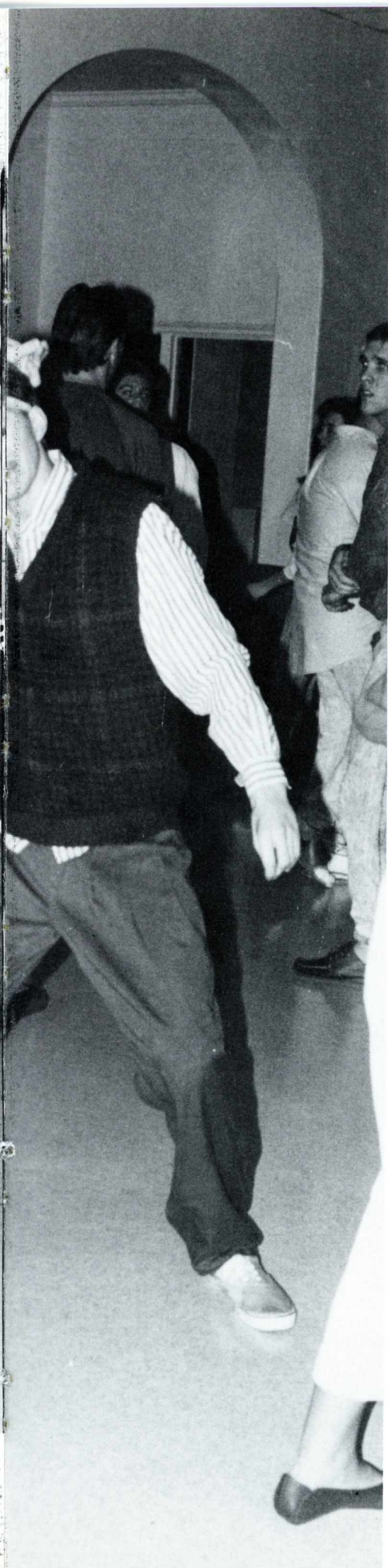
These outings could include things such as playing at Clifty, or taking the youngster to the movies

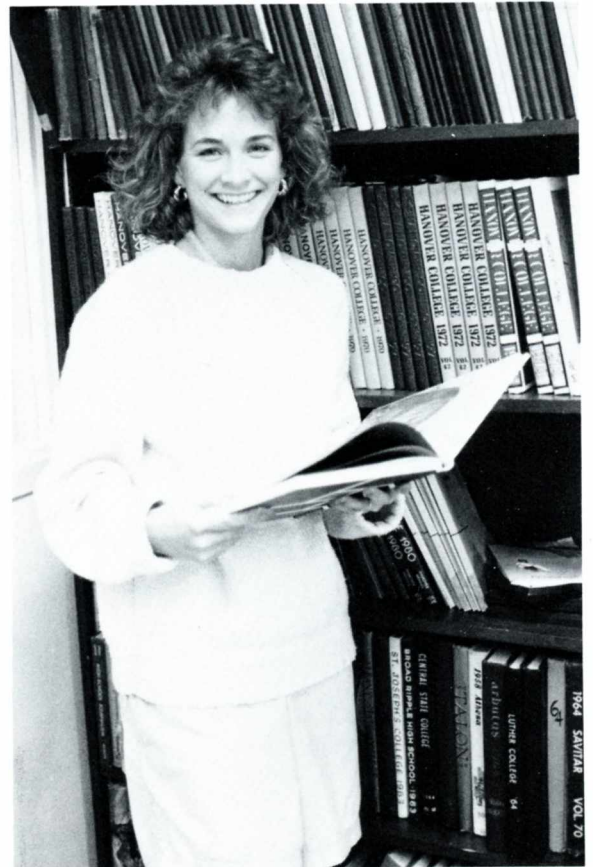
Every editor and staff person has been an important part of this book. The fact that large numbers of people were not involved in the past books is precisely why the organization ultimately failed.

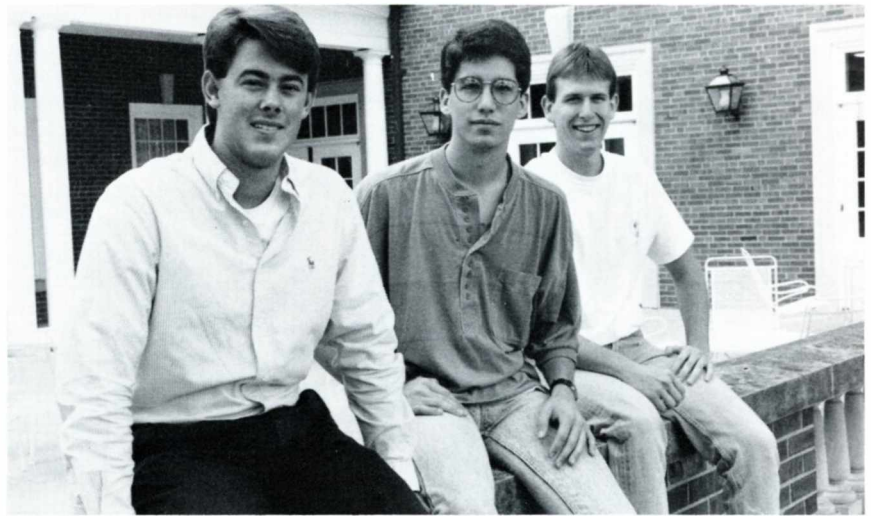
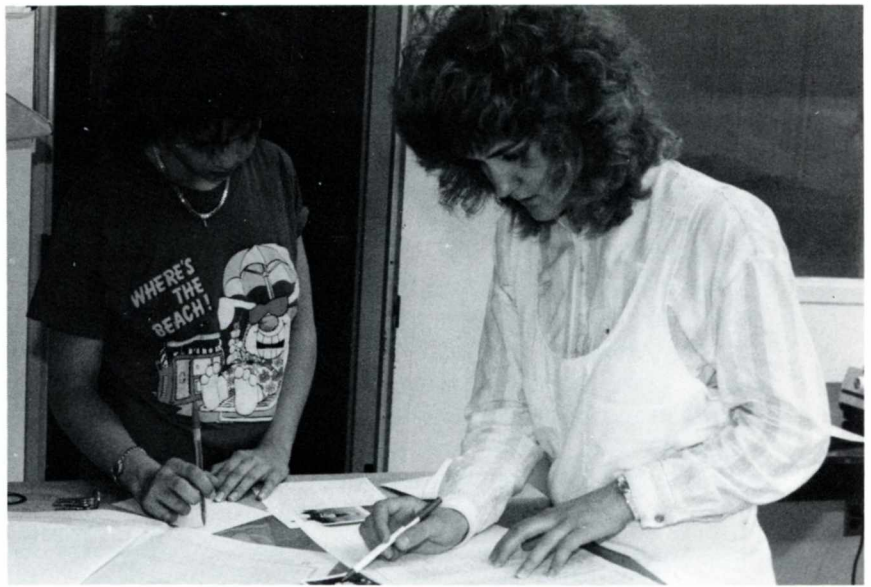

Also active on the Hanover campus was the College Republicans.

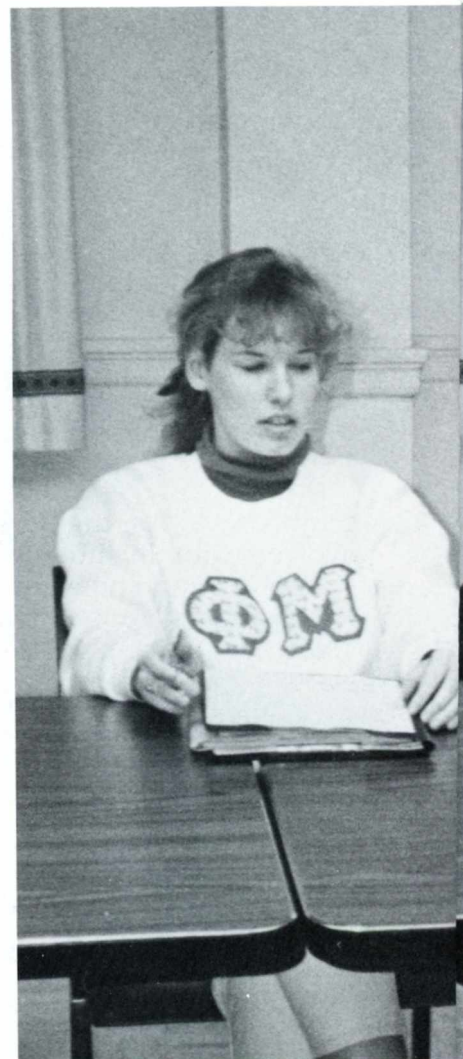
Under the leadership of junior Heather Herron, the club raised its membership to much higher levels than previous years.

The officers for this year included president Glen Flaningham, and vice president/treasurer Liz Howard.

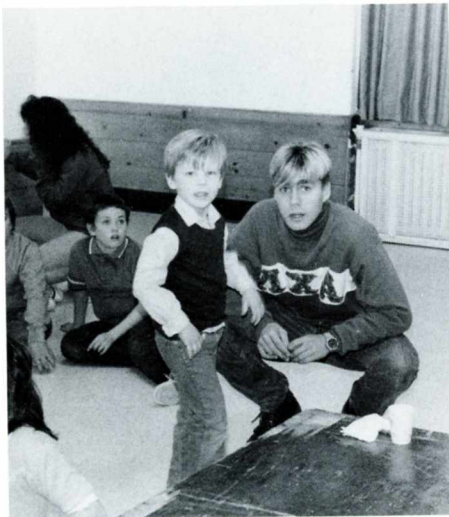

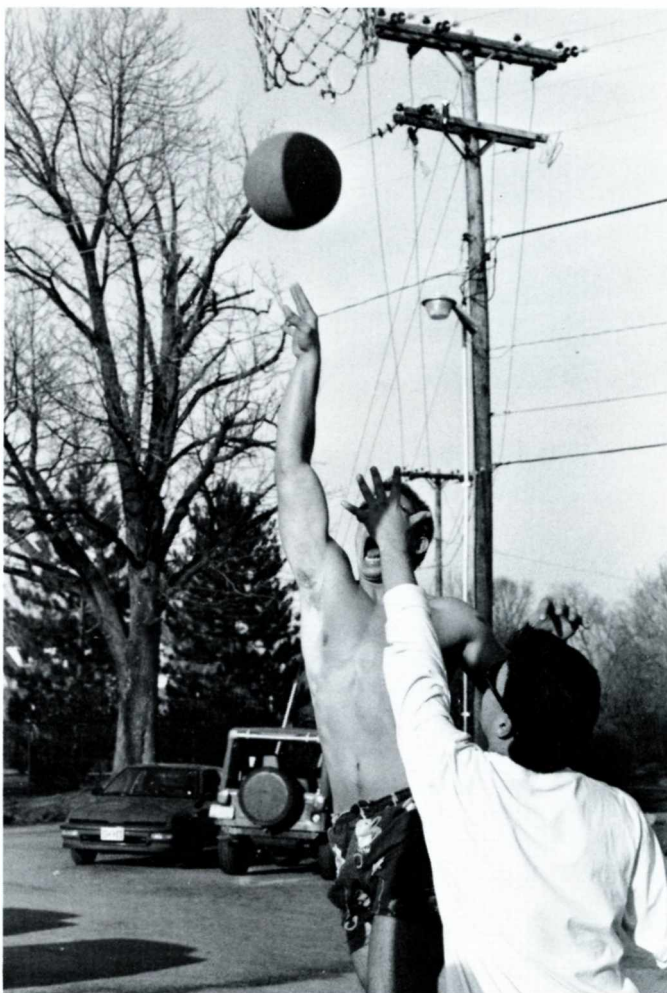

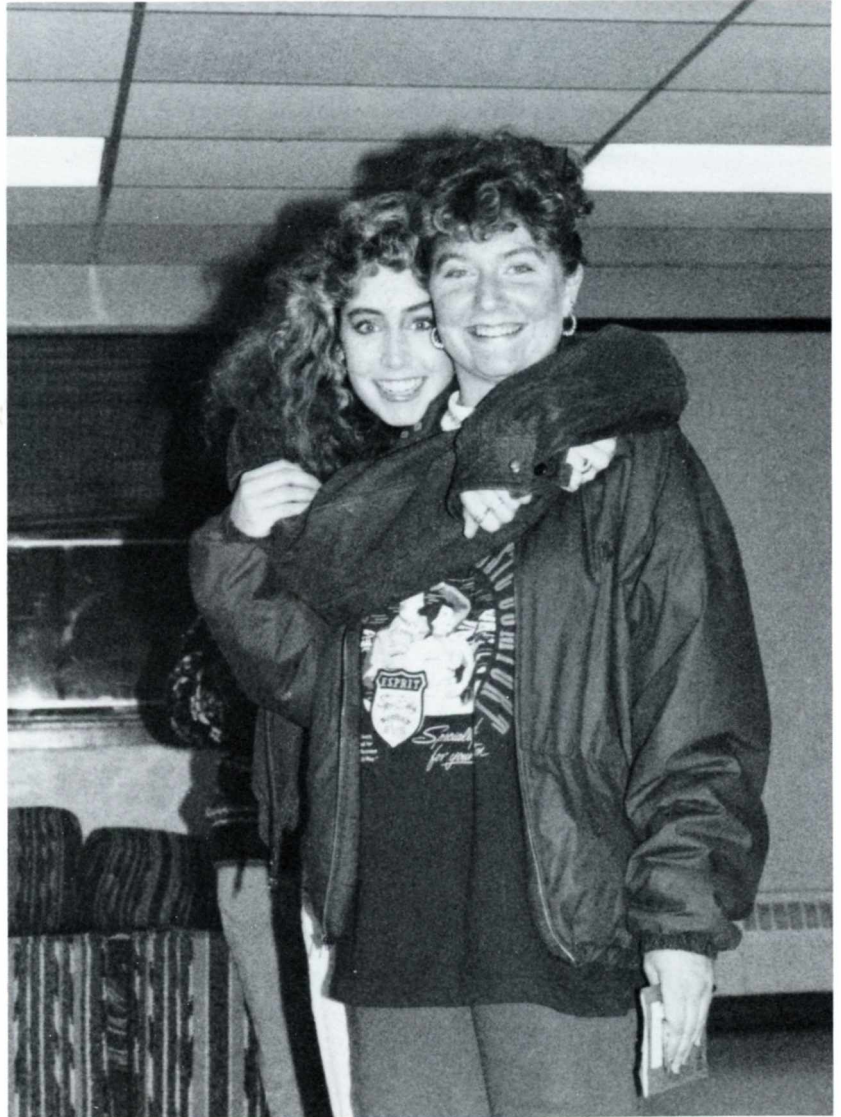


Once again, the members of Kappa Alpha Theta enjoyed a very successful year on campus. Both socially and academically, the women maintained high expectations and fulfilled them.

Under the leadership of president Shelley Hufford, the chapter kept its high standards, with several philanthropic events carried out through the year.



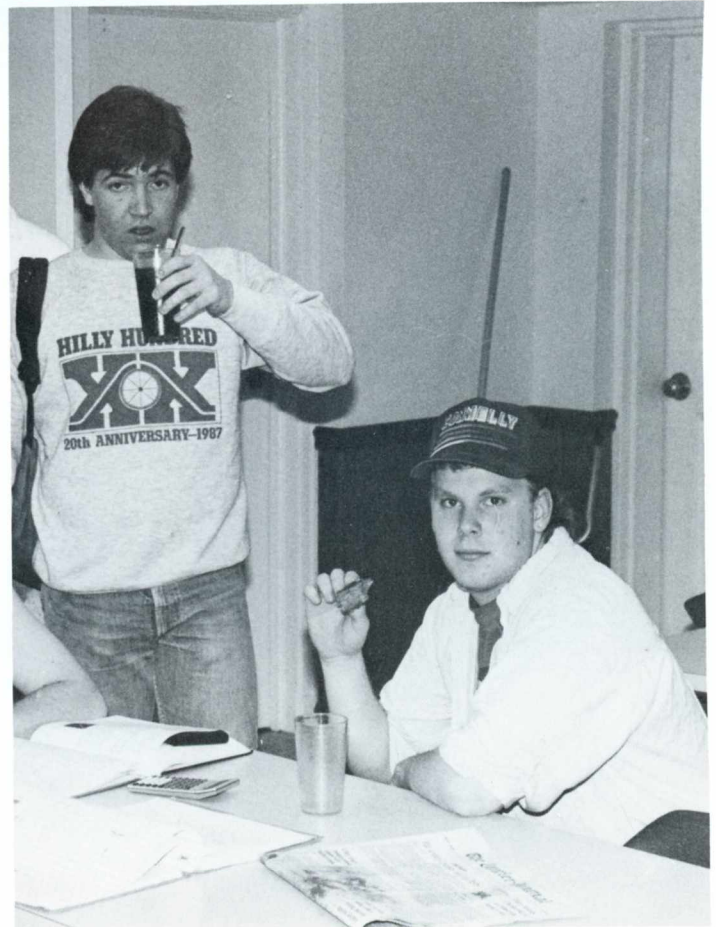

They are the youngest and largest fraternity with nearly 100 active members.

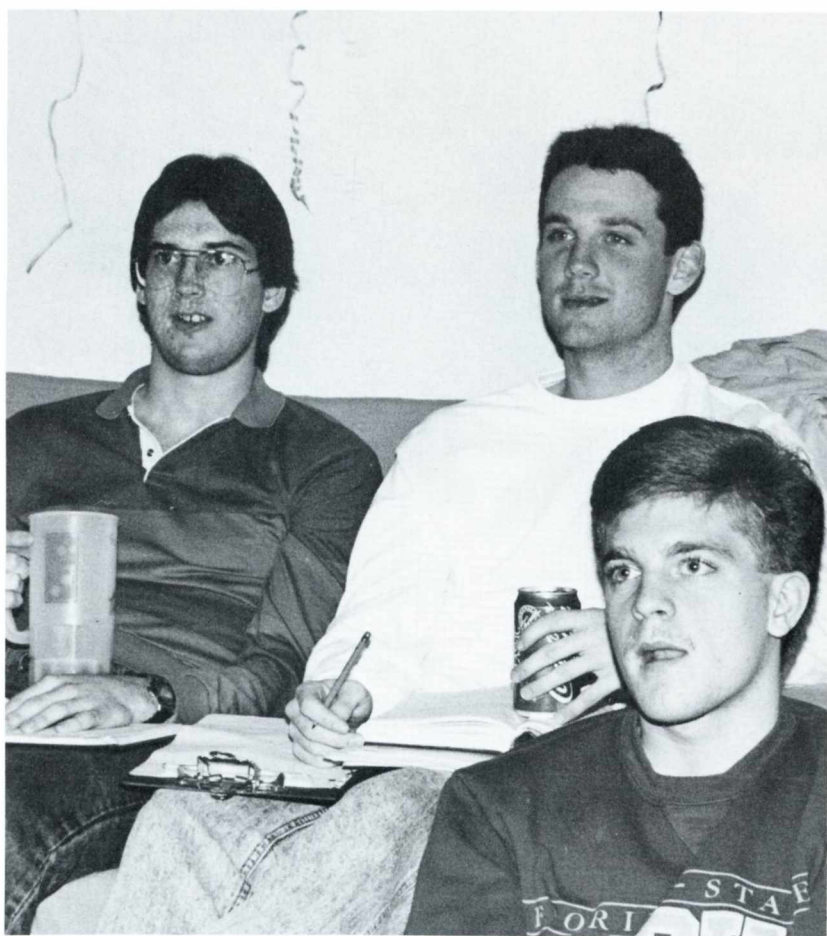

The chapter has members in nearly every varsity sport and campus activity at Hanover.

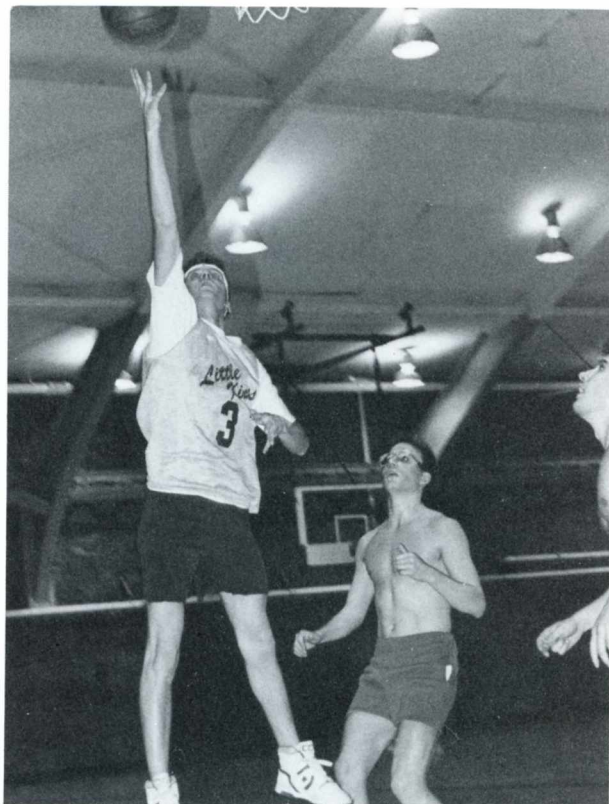

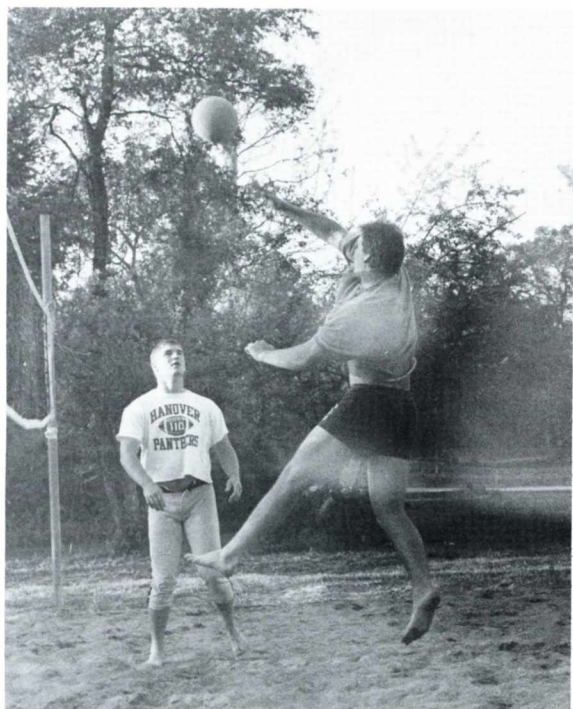

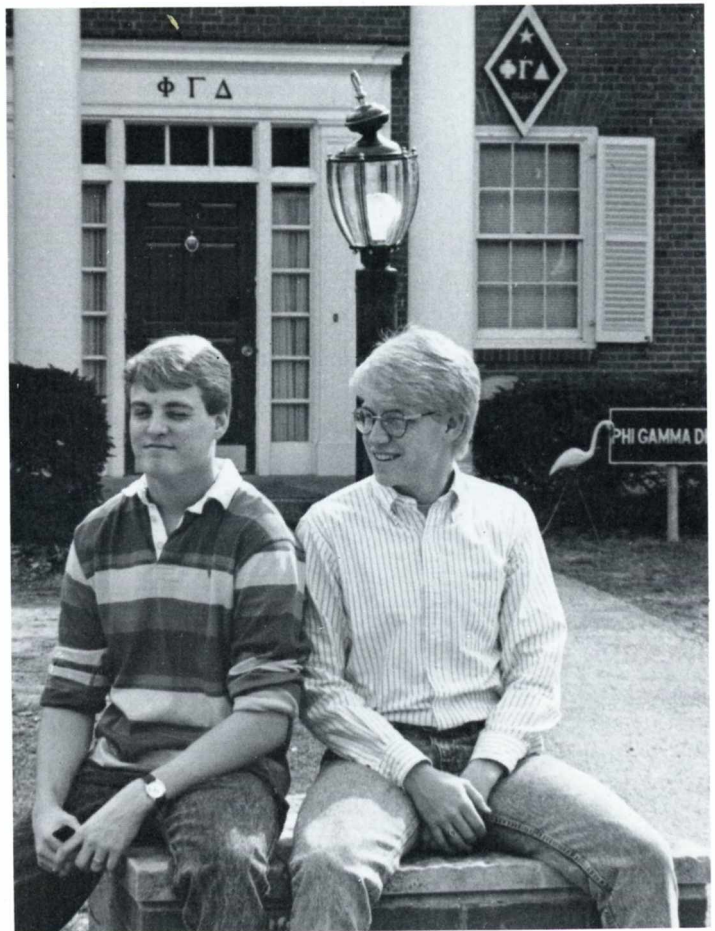
The men of Phi Gamma Delta

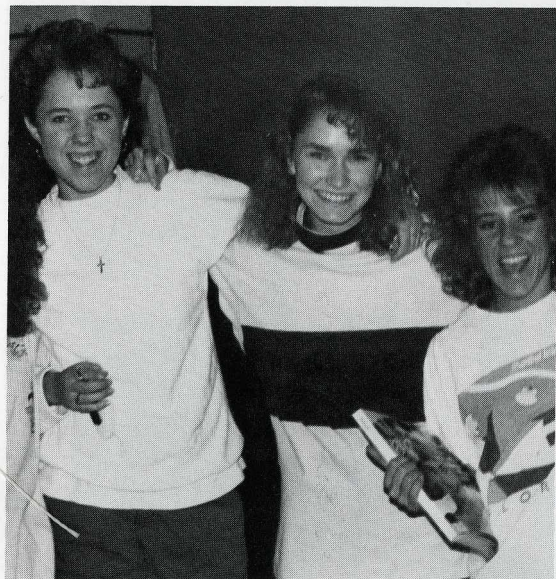

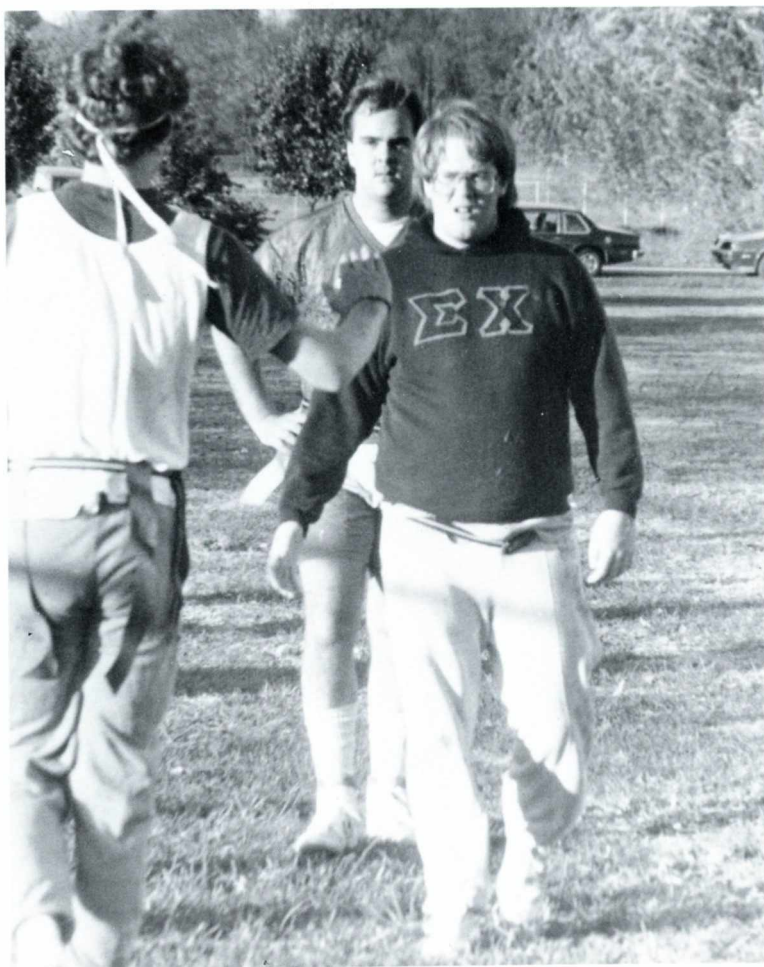

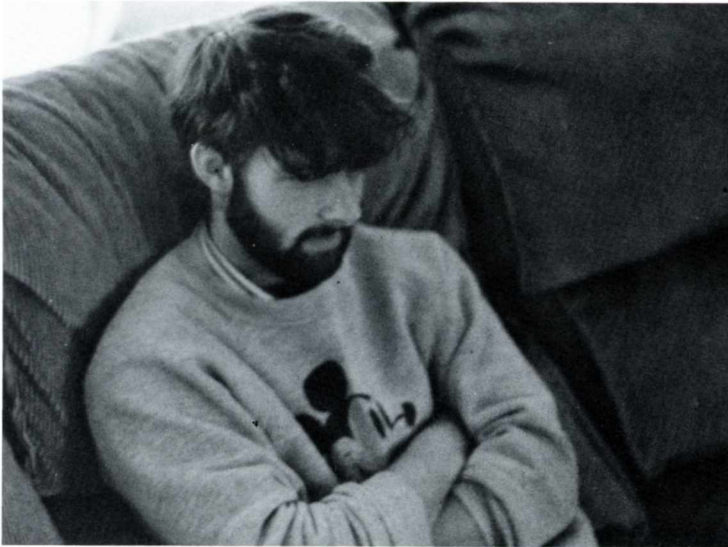
The 1988-89 academic year was a very busy one for the men of the Chi chapter of Sigma Chi fraternity. It was not only a busy year, but a successful one as well.

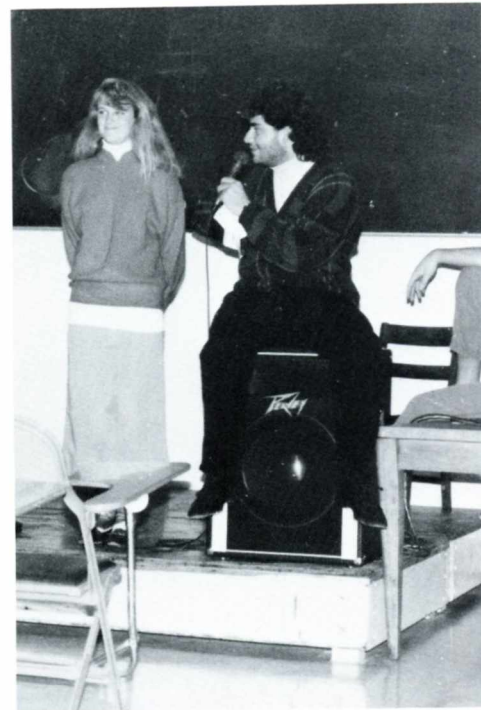


LIVING UNITS

The hall government also donated \$100.00 to the Tarin Thomas memorial fund.

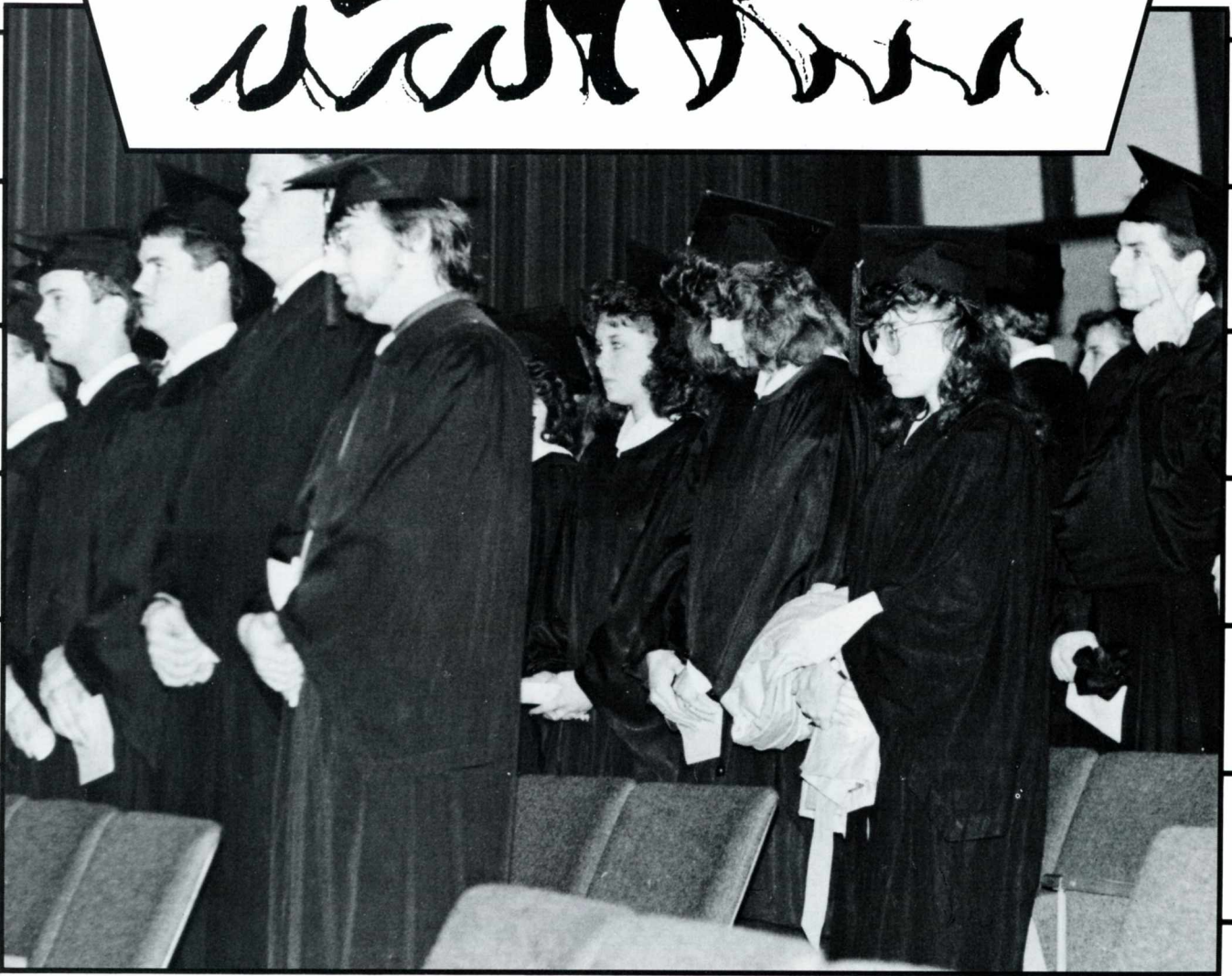
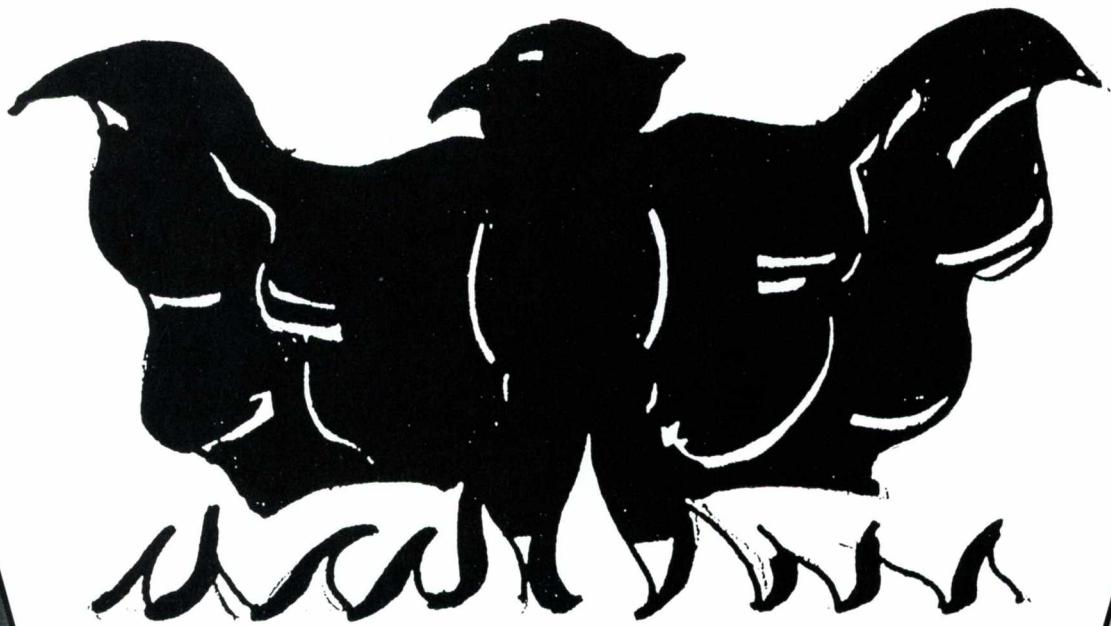
