


Dearest "Red":




INTERIOR OF WOMEN'S DORMITORY; EAST WING






### The Y. W. C. A. Cabinet

## *Hanover's Pony Backfield*






MEN'S GYM CLASS


### INTER-FRATERNITY TENNIS TOURNEY
