☞ The public are undoubtedly apprised of the calamity with which, in the providence of God, we have been visited since the publication of our last Annual Catalogue. They are aware that a Tornado, whose almost unparalleled violence and destruction, have caused its publicity throughout the Nation, has passed over us.

Lest, however, there should be some, into whose hands this catalogue may be placed, who have seen no account of the matter, it is thought proper to state the fact; which may in part account for the diminution of the number of students connected with the Institution. Although the *wing* of the building was entirely destroyed, and the main building very much damaged; yet such repairs have been made that no inconvenience is *now* felt by the students from these losses. The injury done to the

property in the village of South Hanover has been entirely repaired; and the Trustees hope soon to be able to make such improvements as will make the Institution more permanent and useful than ever. Their opinion of the advantageous location of Hanover College, and of the confidence reposed in them by the community, has been greatly confirmed by the fact that *so many* have remained in the Institution, under so unfavorable circumstances.

COURSE OF STUDY.

PREPARATORY DEPARTMENT.

Bucolics and 4 books of the *Æneid* of Virgil, Cicero's Select Orationes, Cæsar's Commentaries, 4 books, New Latin Tutor, Jacob's Greek Reader, Colburn's Arithmetic, Sequel, and Algebra, Niles' Latin, and Buttmann's Greek Grammar, English Grammar and Geography.

FRESHMAN CLASS.

FIRST SESSION.—Geometry, and the Application of Algebra to Geometry, Roman Antiquities, Roman History, Sallust, and Græca Majora, (Historians.)

SECOND SESSION.—Application of Algebra to Geometry, continued, Grecian Antiquities, Horace, (Odes and Satires,) Homer's *Iliad*, Plane Trigonometry, Mensuration, Surveying, and Navigation.

SOPHOMORE CLASS.

FIRST SESSION.—Geometry of Planes and Solids, and Spherical Trigonometry, Grecian History, Cicero de Officiis, and Livy, Græca Majora, (Orators.)

SECOND SESSION.—Projections of Maps and Charts, Dialling, Nautical Astronomy, Trigonometrical Surveying and Levelling, Grecian

History, continued, Horace, (Epistles and Art of Poetry,) Georgics of Virgil, Græca Majora, (Bucolic Poetry.)

JUNIOR CLASS.

FIRST SESSION.—Mental Philosophy, Conic Sections, and Fluxions, on the principles of La Grange, Modern History. Rhetoric, Cicero de Oratore, Chemistry, Græca Majora, (Philosophers.)

SECOND SESSION.—Evidences of Christianity, Astronomy, History, Tacitus, Græca Majora, (Tragic Poetry.)

SENIOR CLASS.

FIRST SESSION.—Moral and Natural Philosophy, review of Mathematics, Belles Lettres, Political Economy, Græca Majora, (Critica.)

SECOND SESSION.—Jurisprudence, review of Astronomy, Geology, Logic, Græca Majora, (Lyric Poetry,) Hebrew or French, at the option of the student.

During the whole course, there are weekly exercises in reading declamation, and composition.

Expenses.

College bills, \$12,50 per session.

Board, from \$1,25, to \$1,75 per week.

Room rent, \$2,00 per session.

Fuel, light, washing, &c. extra.

To those who wish to avail themselves of the advantages of manual labor, an opportunity is afforded to do so.

Examinations.

1. Of all the classes at the close of the session.
2. Of candidates for degrees, six weeks before commencement.

Vacations.

1. Spring Vacation, from the last Wednesday in March to the first Monday in May.

2. Autumn, from the last Wednesday in September to the first Monday in November; and it is very desirable that ALL the students should be present at the commencement of the session.

Admission.

TESTIMONIAL.—The candidate for admission to college, previous to his examination, must produce satisfactory evidence that he sustains a fair moral character, and that he has completed the part of the course preparatory to the standing for which he is offered a candidate. If he has been a member of another college, a certificate of regular dismissal will also be required.

PAYMENTS.—The tuition fee and room rent for the session will be required in advance.

No deductions made for the loss of the first two months of the session.

The Faculty recommend to parents who send sons to this institution under the age of SIXTEEN, to select for them a guardian, either a member of the Faculty, or some gentleman residing in this village, whose duty it shall be to provide boarding, and, in case of sickness, medical attendance for those committed to his care; to exercise a diligent inspection over their morals, and to attend, as far as desired, to their pecuniary concerns.

When such a guardian is not selected by the parent, the student may choose his guardian, or the Faculty will appoint one for him.

Literary Societies.

There are connected with the college, three literary societies—the “UNION LITERARY,” “PHILOSOPHRONIAN,” and “WHIG.” These societies meet weekly for exercises in declamation, composition, and discussion; and have public exhibitions on the last three evenings of the winter session. Each of these societies has a well selected library, amounting in all to more than 2,000 volumes.

GENERAL REMARKS.

The Board of Directors are appointed annually, one half by the Trustees of College, and the other half by the Synod of Indiana, and such other Synods and Presbyteries as may hereafter adopt the Plan of Union. The Board meet annually, at the close of the term, or oftener, by a special call. The term consists of eight months, commencing with the first Monday in November, and ending the last day in June,—making a vacation of four months. A public examination of all the students is held at the close of every term. Those belonging to the two lower classes are examined on those subjects which have engaged their attention during the term; the Senior Class, on the entire course.

The course of studies is adapted to the plan of the Seminary, which requires three Professors, each of whom attends to the same class on different days of the week, or at different hours of the same day. It is also adapted to the time of continuance in the Seminary, viz. three years. The students are divided into three classes, the Junior, Middle, and Senior. One year is spent in the studies of each of these classes.

With the Professor of Biblical Literature, the students attend to the original languages of the Scriptures, Biblical Literature, Archæology, and Hermeneutics. With the Professor of Ecclesiastical History, to Sacred Chronology, Biblical and Ecclesiastical History, Church Government, and the Composition and Delivery of Sermons. With the Professor of Theology, to a short course of Mental and Moral Philosophy, Natural and Revealed Religion, Didactic, Polemic, and Pastoral Theology.

During the first year, the Junior Class attends the Professor of Biblical Literature five days in the week; the Professors of Theology and History, each, *one* day in the week. The second year, the Middle Class attends the Professor of Theology *three* days in each week; the Professor of History *two*, and of Biblical Literature *two*. The third year, the Senior Class attends the Professor of History *three* days in each week; the Professor of Theology *two*, and of Biblical Literature *one*. Though the Chair

of History is still vacant, none of the studies belonging to that department are omitted. They are divided between the other Professors, and pursued in the regular order.

Lectures are delivered more or less frequently, as is deemed expedient; and such books as may be useful, on the different subjects, are recommended. The Students are required to illustrate, prove, and defend all doctrines, and explain, and enforce all duties, by explicit and appropriate passages from the Holy Scriptures. *The Bible is admitted and studied as the supreme authority.* In whatever order the different topics in theology may be considered, the doctrines inculcated, as nearly as can possibly be ascertained, are those of the Holy Scriptures. So far as any other text book than the Bible is used, it is the Confession of Faith. This book is to be adopted with all the solemnity of vows to God, by all who are to be licensed and ordained to the ministry, in the Presbyterian church, and ought to be well understood. It is, therefore, to be analyzed and compared, in all its details, with the Sacred Scriptures.

Location.

The village in which Hanover College is located is six miles below the city of Madison, forty-five miles above Louisville Ky., and one mile N. W. from the Ohio River. The beautiful stream which flows so near, renders it easily accessible from all places which lie E., S., or S. W.; while the Madison and Indianapolis Rail Road, but a few miles distant, will, when completed, open a ready communication with the whole interior of the state of Indiana.

The village is large enough to afford the facilities necessary to the comfort of students; while it is sufficiently small and retired to insure a freedom from the temptations and hurtful influences of larger and more commercial places.

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
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
