This was the second baby shower I attended virtually this year. We all sent gifts in advance, played online shower games, and then watched the mama to be open gifts.

That evening, we grilled out and had my dad over to eat. The kids spent the evening playing outsideriding bikes, swinging, blowing bubbles, and using sidewalk chalk.

I will remember how intentional we all became about making fun memories for our children- special art projects, zoom family and friend gatherings, cooking together in the kitchen, family movie nights, family parties, etc. We had to get very creative with all this extra time together. I will remember getting to have a family dinner every evening for a year.

There's a lot I have missed - dinners out, experiencing the arts with others, church in person. But I think there will be a lot about the pandemic I will miss once we are out of it- a slower pace, lots of family time, time to read, time to cook, time to rest.
