COURSE OF INSTRUCTION.

PREPARATORY STUDIES.

Æneid and Bucolics of Virgil, Cicero's Select Orations, Cæsar's Commentaries, 4 books, Jacob's Greek Reader, Colburn's Arithmetic and Algebra, Gould's Adams' Latin, and Buttman's Greek Grammar, English Grammar, and Geography.

FRESHMAN STUDIES.

FIRST SESSION.

Geometry, and the application of Algebra to Geometry, Roman Antiquities, Sallust, and Græca Majora, (Historians.)

SECOND SESSION.

Application of Algebra to Geometry, continued, Roman Antiquities continued, Horace, (Odes and Satires,) Græca Majora, (Heroic Poets,) or Homer's Iliad, Plane Trigonometry, Mensuration, Surveying and Navigation.

SOPHOMORE STUDIES.

FITST SESSION.

Geometry of Planes and Solids, and Spherical Trigonometry, Grecian Antiquities, Cicero de Officiis, and Livy, Græca Majora, (Orators.)

SECOND SESSION.

Topography, Trigonometrical Surveying and Levelling, Grecian Antiquities continued, Horace, (Epistles and art of Poetry,) Georgics of Virgil, Græca Majora, (Bucolic Poetry.)

JUNIOR STUDIES.

FIRST SESSION.

Conic Sections and Fluxions, (on the principles of La Grange,) History, Rhetoric, (by Blair,) Cicero de Oratore, Græca Majora, (Philosophers and Critics.)

SECOND SESSION.

Astronomy, Chemistry, (by Mitchell,) History, Tacitus, Græca Majora, (Tragic Poetry.)

SENIOR STUDIES.

FIRST SESSION.

Natural Philosophy, Review of Mathematics, Belles Lettres, Political Economy, Græca Majora, (Lyric Poetry.)

SECOND SESSION.

Moral Philosophy, and Mental Philosophy, (by Payne,) Review of Astronomy, Logic, Hebrew or French at the option of the student.

During the whole course there are weekly exercises in reading, speaking, and composition.

EXAMINATION.

1. Of all the classes at the close of the session.

2. Of candidates for degrees six weeks before commencement.

VACATIONS.

1. Spring vacation, from the last Wednesday in March to

the first Monday in May.

2. Autumn, from the last Wednesday in September to the first Monday in November; and it is very desirable that ALL the students should be present at the commencement of the session.

This calculation has reference only to those students who work on the farm, and who are upwards of 15 years of age. Mechanics will have the privilege of making their own engagements for work, and enjoying the entire profits. Boys under 15 years of age will receive wages according to the value of their labor.

ADMISSION.

Testimonial.—The candidate for admission to college, previous to his examination, must produce satisfactory evidence that he sustains a fair moral character, and that he has completed the part of the course preparatory to the standing for which he is offered. If he has been a member of another college, a certificate of regular dismission will also be required.

Payments.—The tuition fee for the session, (\$10,) will be

required in advance.

EXTRACTS OF THE REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES OF HANOVER COLLEGE.

The plan of the Manual Labor Department of this Institution having been reported last year, the Trustees would just say that they have made no radical change in it, except it be the introduction of printing. They have at present two presses in operation; and can give employment to about thirty students, two hours per day. Their plan contemplates the employment of from fifty to seventy young men in this way, as soon as circumstances will permit. This can be done by employing two or three additional presses on the stereotype work, which will furnish a very healthful employment. Farming, circumstanced as they are, is found to be less profitable than they had anticipated, and will consequently not be carried on extensively. During the winter session, a number of young men are profitably employed in cutting wood. The effects of the system are, the Trustees believe, of the most salutary kind.

We notice first the throwing open the doors of the halls of science, to enterprising and talented youth, in all the varied walks of life. The fact that not more than one out of one hundred of the youth of our country, is found enjoying the advantages of a liberal education, is attributable, not to the want of talent or enterprise, but to the absolute impracticability of availing themselves of those advantages. Of the truth of this position, an illustration is at hand. Less than eight years ago, a little grammar school of six scholars, commenced on the manual labor system, formed the nucleus of Hanover College, which numbers at this time nearly two hun-

dred students.

And that intellectual improvement is not impeded by two or three hours per diem, devoted to some healthful employment, the Trustees are happy to be able to appeal to those gentlemen who have attended the examinations of their students; being persuaded that it would bear a comparison with the examination of students of the same grade in any of the colleges in the West. Vigorous health, and an almost entire freedom from those diseases, to which students and men of sedentary habits are subject, form no unimportant item in the good effects of the system. This is conspicuously true in our institution. Dyspepsia is scarcely known by name, and there has but one death occurred among the students since its organization; and that was a year and a half ago, by cholera. In fine, the spirit of independence and enterprise, together with the habits of industry and economy generated and cherished by the system, should be sufficient to recommend it to all patriots and philanthropists, were there no other good ef-

fect resulting from it.

The Trustees are happy to be able to state that the most perfect unanimity in plans, and cordiality in feelings, seem so exist among the members of the faculty, and that docility and subordination characterize the students. And at this moment of religious and political excitement, when other institutions both in the East and in the West, have been convulsed by a spirit of disorganization, it is peculiarly pleasing to find so large a number of young gentlemen collected from eight or nine different states, manifesting toward each other no other feelings than those of fraternal affection. And while there is a careful avoidance of the inculcation of purely sectarian principles, the great and fundamental doctrines of the Bible, are not only made the basis and standard of morality, but daily impressed on the minds of the students as worthy of their most serious attention.

In conclusion, the Trustees have only to regret that they are unable, for want of funds, to carry out their plans, and the consequent hazard to which the experiment is unavoidably exposed. But confiding in the patronage of an enlightened community, and in the smiles of a beneficent Providence, they feel encouraged to go forward.
