

"One Day in May"

I woke up this morning in Abiquiu, NM on Ghost Ranch as a part of a geology field course. After a breakfast served in Ghost Ranch's dining hall, I went on a hike with my field partner, Katie White, to map Section 1 of the Abiquiu Quadrangle. With about six different layers of pastel deposits, it is no wonder that Ghost Ranch was once home to Georgia O'Keefe, the well-known American Painter. Our morning hike ended around 11:00 AM, just as the sun began to shine down from directly overhead. After lunch, we proceeded to draw deposit boundaries on our map. This office work was followed with a well-needed map (for our hike was approximately 6 miles). We have less than a week left here on Ghost Ranch, which is a thought that I do not enjoy thinking about. My professor, Dr. Heyo Van Iten, seems to have a liking for this place that is evidently contagious, as I am dreading our departure this coming Sunday.
